Manchester, Eng., March 12 -James Patten, the Chicago wheat and cotton manipulator, was hooted out of the Machester Cotton Exchange today.

Mr. Patten was recognized a few minutes after he entered the exchange and was immediately surrounded by a hooting crowd. Brokers came to the big manipulator's aid and escorted him to the street, where the hostile demonstration was renewed with such vigor that a strong force of police was called. "We don't want bread stealers or otton thieves here!" shouted members of the mob as they shook their fists in his face. For a while it looked as the


