COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

Proceedings March Meeting. Report On Contagious Diseases. Tax Precinct Vote.

At 11 o'clock a. m., March 17th, the Board convened, Commissioners present: Chairman C. E. Foy, A. E. Wadsworth, G. V. Richardson, J. B. Harvey, and County Attorney E. M. Green.

Mr. H. D. Gaskins of No. 2 Township, appeared before the Board and requested that three hundred twenty-four acres of land which is listed to himself, was an error, and should have been listed by him to H. D. Gaskins and Ben Lee, of the same township.

It is therefore ordered that H. D. Gaskins and Ben Lee be charged with three hundred and twenty-four acres of land at four hundred dollars, as an additional on their tax list, and the same be deducted from H. D. Gaskins.

Ordered that B. P. Dall, convicted at the February Term of Criminal Court, be hired to Mr. Geo. K. West, for the remaining eight months, of his sentence in accordance with the order of the said court, permitting said Dall to be hired for the sum of one hundred twelve dollars and fifty cents; one-half of the said sum be paid in monthly installments to the County for their part of the cost, and the other one-half to be paid to the family of said Dall, in monthly installments, during the said eight months.

In the matter of the complaint from the Stock Law District of No. one Township, it was suggested by Mr. G. S. Dixon that the present committee be continued for sixty days; in the meantime the tax payers in the aforesaid district would have a meeting, and make a selection of a committee to serve the district. By consent of all parties present, it was agreed and it is so ordered that the present committee be continued for sixty days.

At 2 o'clock p. m. the Board takes a recess.

At 3 o'clock p. m. the Board convenes Commissioners present: Chairman C. E. Foy, A. E. Wadsworth, G. V. Richardson, J. B. Harvey, and County Attorney E. M. Green.

Mr. C. S. Dixon, one of the judges of the election of Maple Cypress Precinct, Township No. one, in which an election has recently been held, to vote a special school tax in said Precinct presented to the Board.

The Committee report that twenty four votes were cast for the special tax and nineteen against the same.

Ordered that the report of the Committee be spread upon the minutes, to-wit:

To The Honorable Board of County Commissioners:

We, the Judges of Special School tax of Maple Cypress Precinct find in counting votes, twenty-four for Special Tax, nineteen against Special Tax.

We appoint G. S. Dixon to present this report.

Mr. J. E. Evans and Mr. Geo. K. West appeared before the Board and asked that their bond be accepted for the payment of the cost due in the case of the State vs. Leslie Evans, amounting to fifty-six dollars and twenty-five cents and that the said Leslie Evans be hired to J. E. Evans for eight months in accordance with the sentence of the Superior Court of Criminal cases Geo. K. West and J. E. Evans having crossed a bond for the same.

Ordered by the Board that the Sheriff release the prisoner, Leslie Evans to J. E. Evans in accordance with the aforesaid bond and agreement.

Whereas, it has come to the attention of this Board that a case of smallpox exists in the City of New Bern, and the same has been attended by the County Supt. of Health.

By reference to Section 4559, Revised of 1908, Volume 2, it is clearly stated that the City Physician shall have charge of all contagious diseases within the city limits, all duties devolving upon the County Supt. of Health by virtue of the said Section 4559, devolve upon the City Physician, and he is subject to the same penalty as the County Physician, for failure to perform said duties.

And Whereas, the city having declined to attend to contagious disease in the city, the County Supt. of Health, having performed those duties, it is ordered that the Supt. of Health be instructed not to attend any more contagious diseases in the city.

Commissioner G. V. Richardson, stated that an income tax is charged against Mr. D. W. Richardson for twenty five hundred dollars when it should be fifty hundred dollars.

It is ordered that the income tax of D. W. Richardson, of No. 2 Township, be reduced from twenty five hundred to fifteen hundred dollars.
