WASHINGTON LETTER

The \$200,000 specially requested by President Taft from congress for District improvements will be used largely in that section of Potomac park south and east of the Pennsylvania railroad embankment.

Of that amount \$100,000 is provided in the river and harbor bill under the heading "Improvement of the Potomac River at Washington." Almost that entire amount is to be expended by Major Morrow, in charge of the river improvement, in deepening and widening the Washington channel and raising the grade of the peninsula of Potomac park to the desired height by depositing on it the material dredged from the river.

To extend Potomac Drive. These operations are planned for the coming working season. They will not only improve the navigation of the river as far west as Fourteenth street, but will put the entire abutting section of the Potomac park in condition for whatever improvements are authorized in the way of roads, athletic fields, gardens, etc.

The additional \$50,000 is required for beginning the actual development of the park south of the railroad embankment. The principal work contemplated is the extension of Potomac drive entirely around the peninsula, a distance of about five miles. The southern end of Potomac park is nearly opposite Giesboro point.

A Necessary Work. In urging liberal appropriation for this work President Taft assured Mr. Taftney of the house appropriation committee that they were necessary not only for the improvement of the national capital and the pleasure and recreation of the people, but also from a sanitary standpoint. He pointed out that the present condition of the unimproved park section was actually detrimental to the health of the residents of Washington, as it contained many stagnant pools and acres of decaying vegetation, making it the best breeding place in this vicinity for mosquitoes and other pests, not excepting the flats of the Anacostia river.

The Barry Statue. "Two million Irish voters to this country want to know why the statue of Commodore Jack Barry has not been erected, as have other statues provided for at the same time," remarked Matthew Cummings of Boston, national president of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, while in this city recently. "At a recent meeting of the organization directed me to visit Washington and learn why the Barry statue commission has not taken final action on the models that were submitted to the members. The Irishmen of this country are opposed to the model submitted by Andrew O'Connor of Paris because they believe it does not do justice to the Irish character nor to Barry. We are opposed to the figures on the base of the model, which we do not believe are representative of the Irish race. We believe also that an inscription should be placed on the base of the statue to show that Barry was a native Irishman."

Commissioned by Washington. "Justice should be done Barry and the Irish citizens of this country in the selection of a proper statue of the father of the American navy. Barry gave up the command of the finest merchant vessel afloat in American waters in 1775 to take command of the Lexington. He captured the first prize taken by the American navy and was the first naval victory. He was the first captain commissioned by Washington."

Senator Depew's Joke. Senator Depew got off a joke in his speech the other day on the bill for a new government of Hawaii. He told how years ago the great nations of the world saw the value of the Hawaiian Islands and endeavored to secure exclusive privileges there through the favor of its sovereign. King Kalakaua was being courted by the United States as well as by other governments. After being treated to a triumphal tour of England he arrived in this country, where he was feted from coast to coast. Finally it came the turn of Chicago to receive the king and entertain him.

"After a weary day at parades and reviews," said Senator Depew, "the then mayor of the metropolis of the west found a king on his hands. He wished, of course, to promote the commercial interests of the city over which he presided. At the same time kings were not in his line, nor was he familiar with their attributes or customs of court or the methods of addressing them. To relieve himself of embarrassment he drove his majesty to the leading hotel and leaving him in the lobby, said:

"Good afternoon, king. We have had a hard day, and I think you had better go to your room and wash up."

Just why some of those persons who have once held official station at the capital should elect to remain here after the tenure of their office has expired can only be explained as the ways of society and the glitter of fashion. Just now at least two former cabinet members are mourning in sorrow because they have lagged to find themselves somewhat ignored save by a few residents.
