VOLCANO ROARS PEOPLE FLEE

Death and Desolation Are Brought to the Mt. Etna District of Sicily.

Catania, Sicily, March 26.—An official report on the volcanic disturbance in the Mount Etna district made public while confirming the gravity of the situation holds out the hope that the worst is over. The craters that may be properly described as new appear to be only four in number. These have opened at the foot of Mount Castellazzo, 4 miles in an air line from the summit of Mt. Etna.

The four streams emitted from these craters have united at the foot of Mt. Castellazzo and formed a great river of lava that is bringing death and desolation into the invaded districts.

Plants, trees and orchards have been destroyed and the lava river has extended nine miles. The people are in terror and thousands have left their homes.

STRIKE OF MINERS REGARDED CERTAIN

Failure to Agree on Wage Scale to Cause Gigantic Walkout

Cincinnati, O., March 26.—Following a complete failure of the operators and miners, who have been in conference here over a new wage scale, to reach any basis of agreement, it was announced today that a strike of the coal miners of Indiana, Ohio and Pennsylvania will in all probability be ordered for April 1.

The sub-scale committee of both owners and operators held their final session yesterday afternoon, and this morning reported to the general committee that all negotiations are off.

As the result the committee were at once dissolved, and it is expected that the President of the United Mine Workers will issue a call during the day for a convention of the miners, and leave it to them to say whether or not the strike will be ordered.

HURLS HERSELF UNDER TRAIN

Engagement Broken for Third Time, Miss Dennis Kills Herself With Locomotive Aid

New York March 26.—Broken-hearted because she had had a quarrel with her fiancé and had broken off their engagement, Katherine Dennis, pretty and nineteen, employed in the lace mills at Patchogue, L. I., committed suicide yesterday noon there by throwing herself in front of the locomotive pulling an east-bound Amagansett and Sag Harbor train. She was struck by the locomotive, tossed far to one side and instantly killed. Tucked in her bodice was found a note she had written in pencil. It was not addressed. It was as follows:

"If anybody wants to know why I did this, they can ask Ollie Kemp. He is the cause of it. Goodbye to all my friends and mamma, papa, sister and brothers. Katherine Dennis, No. 2 Waverly avenue, Patchogue, L. I."

The Kemp referred to in the note a Louis Ollington Kemp twenty-three, and well thought of in the community. He was much shocked. He said that he and Miss Dennis had been engaged for two years, but they had quarrels and the engagement was twice broken off. It was broken off a third time a few days ago, owing, he said, to the causeless jealousy of the young woman. She had sent a boy to him demanding that he return all her letters and everything belonging to her.

She left the lace mill about 11 o'clock yesterday morning and was seen a little later waiting by the railroad track. When the train came along she waited until it was quite close and then threw herself in front of it.

Washington, March 26.—The report issued today shows the total supply of cotton for the six months period, ending February 26th to have been 11,256,261 running bales, made up as follows: 1,483,685 held September 1, 1909, ginned during period, 9,774,998, net imports, 33,778; the distribution is 2,526,983 bales consumed, 3,599,682, exported 1,674,831, held in mills 1,932,521 in independent warehouses and other stocks, 818,844.
