CURTAILMENT BY MILLS

Because of Goods Situation. Mills And Farmers Reserves of Cotton Look Ample

Greensboro, N. C. March 28.—Since I wrote last, the markets have not witnessed any important changes. Spot cotton is not any dearer, in fact, is somewhat lower to sell.

Futures are a trifle higher under the influence of a threatened corner in New York. A large part of the spot business done recently has been with England as they find an improving condition in export trade, especially with India. This trade coming to the English Mills is not referred to as very profitable, but it affords enough nourishment to re-start many idle looms and to keep the trade hopeful. Whether or not it will be lasting is uncertain, but it is well to note that July Liverpool is selling about \$2.00 per bale discount under March Liverpool and when carrying charges are considered, this makes the discount about \$4.00 per bale.

In this country the condition of the textile trade is constantly growing worse. There is hardly a mill running on anything except specialties or very fine goods that can break even and in some cases the losses are startling.

Curtailment is going on to a large extent and if it was not for the fear of mill labor turning to other pursuits, it would be double what it is because every mill owner admits that running now tends to further demoralize the goods situation for this summer and promises to spoil the prospect for profits next fall.

Increased curtailment is likely for the reasons stated and because the opportunity for labor to turn to farming and other pursuits will soon be passed for the season, and short time in the summer is not so hard on the help because the cost of living is much cheaper.

As to the outcome of the threatened corner in New York, spinners should bear in mind that the accumulation of cotton in New York is only a temporary affair and that every bale will ultimately go to the mills. After the manipulators get it, they will be willing, probably anxious, to sell it, because the high prices make the carrying charges heavy and if one looks at the quotations in Liverpool, New York and New Orleans, they will see that this cotton must be carried against discount, instead of against premiums.

Recent developments tend to make me believe that the mill reserves are much larger and the farmers holdings somewhat greater than I thought some weeks back. Under all the circumstances, 15c seems a high price for cotton and if the strong hand of manipulation was removed, prices would probably decline.

The new crop is all that could be desired, but there is a part of Texas where the subsoil moisture is insufficient and will not suffer at present, the trade is alarmed on the fear that rains may not come when needed. The new crop impresses me as selling at a reasonable price.

There will probably be an increased acreage and fertilization in every State. J. E. LATHAM.

VISITED BY GHOST CONFESS MURDER

Superstitious Italians Terrified by Supposed Vision of Their Victim.

Boston, Mass., March 28.—Superstitious belief that they had seen a ghost led to the confession of Domenico Chiofalo, Archillo Luist and Pasquale Cirillo, three Italians, who began long prison sentences today for the murder of Daniel F. Desmond.

The three were in the Charles street jail, charged with the murder, but the evidence against them was not convincing. At midnight Cirillo told the court he was awakened by a sensation he could not describe. Then the face of Desmond appeared, pressed against the steel bars of his cell, and pointed toward Cirillo. The latter was too terrified to speak, he said, but after the "ghost" had vanished he awakened his friends and told them of the visitation.

All were terror-stricken, and immediately confessed to the killing of Desmond in an affray. They must serve from twelve to eighteen years in prison.

BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN

Of The City Of New Bern N. C. Be It Ordained

That it shall be unlawful for any person, not over nineteen years of age, to enter a public pool room in the city of New Bern; or to play pool or billiards in a pool room or billiard parlor.

That each person, less than nineteen years of age, who shall enter such pool or billiard parlor, or play pool or billiards in such public pool room or billiard parlor, shall be fined five dollars (\$5.00), and the proprietor or his employees who permit a person, less than nineteen years of age, to enter such pool room or billiard parlor or engage in playing pool or billiards in such public pool room and billiard parlor shall be fined five dollars (\$5.00) for such offense.

A passage by the excellent train yesterday morning informed a Journal representative that he would have been on his way to Cambridge, Mass., to see the trial of George W. Coleman.

Cambridge, Mass., March 28.—In a confession made by George W. Coleman and given out by his attorney, the young man charged with embezzlement from the national city bank of Cambridge admitted that he took \$280,000 and that practically every cent of it was lost in trying to "break a fare bank" in New York.

Coleman said he was introduced to the game by a Boston man several years ago and lost \$35,000 of his own at that time. Two years later he met other Boston men who interested him in the same game, he said, and between last May and February he made at least fifty trips to New York, taking with each time sums varying from \$2,000 to \$5,000 all of which he lost.

These men, said Coleman knew where the money was coming from as he told them he was "getting it wrong."

The alleged disclosures were made at Coleman's home in Cambridge in the presence of two Cambridge police officials, Coleman's attorney Wilson W. Lockhart the young assistant of Coleman at the bank, who is also charged with embezzlement and a newspaper reporter.
