WANTONLY SHOT BY STRANGE MEN

Twelve Year Old Girl Seriously Wounded by Men Denied Night's Lodging

Tazewell, Va., March 30.—The twelve year-old daughter of Charles Kinder was shot in the temple last night about 9 o'clock and very seriously but not fatally wounded by one of the two men who were passing through the valley, they said, on their way from the coal fields to their homes in North Carolina. They gave their names as Long and Shumate.

The two men stopped at Kinder's house about dark, saying that they had lost their way, and asked for a night's lodging. This was refused and the men were directed on their way.

After leaving the house they began firing revolvers, one ball going into Kinder's house, striking the little girl as above stated. The men were arrested and are now in jail. They claim they shot at a rabbit and did not intend shooting toward the house. There was strong talk of a lynching in the valley, but the prompt arrival of the sheriff and his posse prevented trouble.

WAGES ARE RAISED GREAT SNOW-STORM RAGES

Pennsylvania Road's Action Affects 175,000.

Philadelphia, March 30.—The Pennsylvania Railroad Co. has made a voluntary increase of 6 per cent in the pay of all employees who now get less than \$300 per month. The raise is to be effective April 1st. About 175,000 men are affected. Notices have been posted at all points on the line east of Pittsburg. It is understood that a similar advance will apply on the lines west of Pittsburg. On the lines east of Pittsburg the Pennsylvania Railroad employs about 123,000 men, the western system 52,000 more.
