At a meeting of the Board of Education which was held in the office of County Superintendent S. M. Brinson, yesterday two petitions for special school tax election were received. One from North Harlowe and the other from Havelock. Both of these petitions were signed by practically every citizen of the two places.

A message from Willis Neck near Vanceboro says that a fierce forest fire is raging in that section and that all efforts to extinguish the conflagration have so far proved to be of no avail. Last week it destroyed hundreds of dollars worth of valuable property and unless it is extinguished in a short while the loss will be much heavier.

Work on the new warehouse which is being erected at pier No. 2 is rapidly progressing. All of the frame work has been placed in position and the large force of workmen employed there are exerting every effort to complete the immense structure as early as possible. 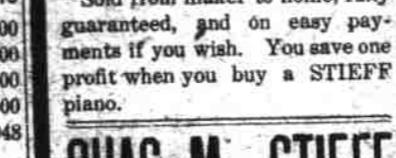
