WOMEN IN BEEF RIOTS

Attack Butcher Shops Where Prices Were Raised. Three Meats in the Street.

New York, April 6th.—Incensed because of the price of meat being raised, more than 500 women attacked several kosher butcher shops in Second avenue, between 101st and 102d streets. During the riot one man was assaulted and policeman O'Rourke, of the 19th street station was roughly handled, his coat being torn and all the buttons ripped off.

For the past few weeks the women have been muttering about the price of meat being raised by the butchers. Chuck steak was 12 and 14 cents per pound on Saturday, yesterday it was raised to 16, and when the women went to the shops this morning they found it 18 cents. They gathered on the sidewalk and talked about the advance, and many threats were made. Finally several of them went to the shops and ordered some meat to be sent to their homes. When the errand boys started to deliver it, the women would seize the meat and throw it into the street.

STEEL CAR STRIKERS

Employees in Detroit, Michigan and Columbus, O. Vote to go on Strike.

Detroit, Mich., April 6.—The returns on a vote of the motormen and conductors employed by the Detroit United Railway shows that the overwhelming majority voted to strike, if necessary, to enforce their demands for an increase in wages to 30 cents an hour.

The matter is now referred to International President Mahon.

"I cannot say at this time that there will be a strike," said Mahon. "The matter will be taken up with the company at an early date."

Columbus, O., April 6.—More than five hundred dissatisfied motorman and conductors of the Columbus Street Railway and Light Company voted to strike at the call of Fred Fay, national organizer of the street railway employees and F. J. Liddy, local representative of the American Federation of Labor.

MURDERS MAN THEN SUICIDES

Is believed That After Having Shot His Friend He Became Excited and Shot Self.

Trenton N. J., April 5.—A tragedy, in which a man was accidentally shot dead followed by the suicide of the man who fired the fatal bullet, occurred early today on the platform of the Philadelphia & Reading Railway station at Trenton junction, five miles from this city. The first victim was Frank Pracella cab driver. The suicide was John Connelly, employed as a watchman by the railroad company at Trenton junction. These men with a railroad detective and the station telegraph operator, were standing on the platform when the shooting occurred. Connelly had two revolvers, one of which was empty. He was showing them to Pracella, the two witness say, and had remarked "How would you like to get a load from this one?" when the weapon was discharged. It is believed Connelly thought he was exhibiting the empty revolver to the cab driver.
