THE WORLD'S NEW RECORD

Destroyer Cuts Through Waves at Rate of Thirty six Miles an Hour

Pensacola, Fla., April 8.—Maintaining a speed of thirty-six miles an hour for four hours, the torpedo boat destroyer Reid established a new world's record for speed by a naval vessel. The vessel was on her final speed test, and aboard were representatives of the Naval Board of Inquiry of Washington.

The destroyer went out on the Gulf at a time when weather conditions were very unfavorable, the Gulf being heavy and rough, but with her powerful turbine engine working in good shape, she cut through the waters like an ocean greyhound, going down the coast for sixty miles, turning without slackening speed and coming back to the starting point.

The Reid is one of the new type of naval vessels recently completed, and more than exceeded the government requirements. Her record exceeded the previous world's record by more than a mile per hour.

BROKERS DIE SIDE BY SIDE

Brothers Who Lost Fortune Found Dead in Woods

Kansas City, Mo., April 8.—Evidence that Nels Ottesen and his brother, formerly operators on the Kansas City Board of Trade, carried out a threat of suicide, following the loss of their money last January, was disclosed when their bodies were found by fishermen in the underbrush about a mile and a half south of the Milwaukee Railroad bridge in the East Bottoms.

Conclusions of a double suicide carefully planned, are induced by the presence of a revolver with two empty chambers, the folded overcoats of the men disposed carefully beneath their heads, and the evident care they had taken to destroy possible marks of identification.

The bodies appeared to have been lying as found more than a month.



EXPECT TO END MINERS' STRIKE

Conference of Mine Owners and Employees in Pittsburg Next Monday

Washington April 8.—At a conference to be held between mine owners and representatives of the striking employes at Pittsburg next Monday, it is expected that arrangements will be made looking to a settlement of the labor troubles in Pennsylvania.

Senator Penrose, John Mitchell, of the A. F. and L., and a number of other labor leaders have been holding conferences here and the statement is made that prospects are favorable for an amicable adjustment of the dispute at the Pittsburg meeting. Senator Penrose has interested himself also in the steel strike in the plants of the United States Steel Corporation, and has; it is understood, made certain proposals for settlement to President McArdle, of the Amalgamated Steel Workers.

Before the labor leaders left here today John Mitchell and President Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, held a short conference on the situation, at which it was agreed that they would meet again in Philadelphia to-morrow night where Gompers is to speak at Witherspoon Hall.
