WASHINGTON LETTER
 By CARL SCHOFIELD, Special Correspondent.
 The District of Columbia claims to have the greatest collection of statues and monuments perpetuating the memory of the nation's great men. No other city can boast of such a valuable array of marble and bronze images of men who helped to make the United States the leading nation of the world.
 The Capital's Statues.
 The total amount of money expended for all the statues in the District is estimated at \$5,000,000. While this sum is enormous, it does not adequately represent the value of the statues. Many of them were erected by acts of congress with money appropriated from the United States treasury, a large number are gifts of patriotic societies, but the greatest collection of all is that in the national hall of fame, in the capitol, which is composed of gifts from the various states. More than fifty statues are still to be added to the collection in the hall of fame by the states.
 Gifts From Foreign Rulers.
 Twice have presents made to the president and other officers of the United States by foreign rulers been the subjects of burglary, but each time they were recovered and are yet in the custody of the government. The provision of section 9, article 1, of the constitution of the United States, which precludes the acceptance by government officers without the consent of congress of "any present, emolument, office or title of any kind whatever from any king or prince or any foreign state," was an enigma to the rulers of foreign countries who sought to honor our country through its officers.
 Many of the gifts referred to were procured after the conclusion of treaties. They were sent to presidents, ministers, commissioners, consuls and officers of the navy, but the consent of congress was obtainable in but few instances, and they went to the custody of the state department, the patent office being the repository. From the latter some of the most valuable were stolen more than sixty years ago, but were recovered and hidden away in the treasury vaults for over thirty years.
 Some of the Treasures.
 Among the presents were two muskets presented to President Jefferson by the bey of Tunis, a cane sent to John Quincy Adams made of an elephant's tusk and gold mounted, a gold snuffbox with the initial A in diamonds presented to General Jackson by Emperor Alexander of Russia, a sword with gold scabbard and mountings presented to Commodore James Biddle by the viceroy of Peru, necklaces of diamonds and pearls, cashmere shawls, Persian rugs, other ornaments of pearls and a gold mounted sword presented to Commodore J. D. Elliot by the imam of Muscat.
 Later other presents were sent by the imam to President Van Buren direct. On Christmas day, 1889, the ship Sultanah arrived at New York with two Arabian horses, a bottle of attar of roses, five demijohns of rosewater, a package of cashmere shawls, a bale of Persian rugs, a box of pearls, etc., most of them for the president, but a sword was for Commodore Elliot and a shawl each for the wives of Lieutenants W. F. Shields and A. H. Foote. The latter officer afterward became an admiral. The horses were sold, and the state department added the other articles to the collection in the patent office.
 There was no day watchman, and Dec. 21, 1841, in broad daylight, the door was opened by means of a false key, and the thief carried off the snuffbox and gold scabbard. The loss was placed at over \$15,000, and a reward of \$1,000 was offered for their recovery. Little was heard of them for a few weeks, but they were recovered in some mysterious manner in Baltimore, soon afterward the National Institute was given charge of the articles as part of the museum, and they were placed in cases for exhibition.
 Thieves Get Jewels.
 As a precaution against any attempt to carry them off bells were attached, ingeniously hidden, but this did not prevent a successful raid. The night of Nov. 8, 1848, there was much excitement in the city, for the result of the election was not then known, and still a late hour there were large crowds upon the streets uncertain as to whether Taylor or Cass was elected president. The building in which the gifts were stored was in charge of two watchmen, and one, having made the rounds at 1 o'clock and found all safe, awoke his mate and turned in. The following morning a rope was found dangling from a window by which a thief had made his escape with the booty. The snuffbox and gold scabbard, the attar of roses, diamonds, pearls and over thirty gold and silver medals were carried off.
 On Exhibition After Many Years.
 The National Institute the day following offered a reward of \$1,000, and in a few weeks the arrest was made of John Haud near Philadelphia. Nearly if not all the property was recovered. The authorities then took no chance and May 10, 1848, turned the articles over to the treasury for safe keeping.
 Feb. 27, 1887, the secretary of the treasury directed the treasurer to deliver the articles to the Smithsonian institution.
 Thus after thirty-eight years the snuffboxes were put in charge of the Smithsonian and again placed on exhibition.

WHAT ATTRACTS IMMIGRATION?
 It is a singular condition confronting this country, when the President's attention has to be called to the expatriation of citizens, and some efforts suggested to stop this outward movement. And yet such a situation presents itself today. From March 31, 1899 to March 1, 1910, more than 12,000 American citizens, mostly farmers, each with sums of money from \$1,000 to \$5,000, voluntarily sold out their homes and took up government homesteads in Canada. Besides these, others left this country, the total number being 95,370. Going back a few years it is found that since March 31, 1897, down to March 31, 1909, 425,460 persons left the United States to reside in Canada permanently. If they took with them the same average amt. as those who left between March 31, 1909, and March 1, 1910, they took \$425,460,000. In all therefore, the emigrants have taken into Canada \$620,830,000 since 1897, practically all in gold.
