HALLEY'S COMET MEASURED

Seven Million Miles Long is Comet's Tail.

San Francisco April 23—A photograph of head and inner part of the tail of Halley's comet in which the length of some of the tail as was recorded was 1,100,000 miles; has been taken at the Lick Observatory by Astronomer Curtis. The photograph was made with the Cresset reflectory of the observatory. The plate was exposed for thirty-five minutes.

The extreme diameter of the head, as shown in the photograph, is 196,000 miles. A photograph, showing the tail on a smaller scale, recorded the total length of nearly three, corresponding to a length in space of more than 7,000,000 miles.

JUDGE D. L. WARD HOLD UP TRAIN SEEKING SLAYER

Governor Kitchin Honors New Bern Lawyer By Appointment.

The expected telegram came yesterday morning from Raleigh, telling of the appointment to the judgeship, Superior Court, David L. Ward, Esq. of this city. In every way was this a most fitting appointment and Governor Kitchin will see it more fully when Mr. Ward enters upon his official duties. Yesterday Mr. Ward was busy receiving congratulations by telegrams and by his home friends.

This appointment of Mr. Ward does not cover the unexpired term of Judge Guion, some four years, for according to custom established, the Democratic State Convention will name a candidate to be voted for in November who will go into office January first and to secure the most of the term, that Judge Guion resigned. Thus Mr. Ward is but judge pro tem, as it were, dependent upon the Democratic voters for the appointment that will make him a real successor to Judge Guion. It would be wise, courteous and democratic, if the July convention shall place without controversy, the name of David L. Ward upon the State Democratic ticket for judge of the third judicial district.

VOICE OF THE PEOPLE.

Let Us Use The Port.

Editor Journal:—I have noted within a few weeks several things that indicate a revival of the shipping interests of this port which was once one of the chief resources of New Bern. Probably this renewed interest is due to the deep waterway which is to be the government project.

A representative of a northern boat company was in the city some days ago making an investigation into the advantages of the port and the freight available, and the report will be a favorable one it is believed. Considerable talk has been of a new boat line to be put on. The dock formerly used by the Norfolk & Southern at the foot of Craven street has been put in repair, and if taken for a terminal would give great facility for freight handling.

Several other items of interest have been mentioned on the quiet in this line and from what can be learned they indicate that this section will have a renewal of its old line advantages of water transportation, to the benefit of all merchants and dealers.

It would be well for the Chamber of Commerce to take some action to show the sympathy of the business men for this proposed service while it has not been spoken of, a small portion of the stock of the boat line might be taken by citizens if offered, which would show their co-operation in the matter. If not this, at least their approval would aid and indicate a probability of their patronage.

Engineer Forced to Stop by Armed Quartette Who Searched Cars.

Berkeley Heights, N. J., April 23—While one man pointed a gun at Engineer William Blazius on a Lackawanna mail train this morning, threatening to shoot if an attempt was made to start the engine three men went through the cars searching for John Grant, the twenty four-year-old fugitive from North Plainfield, where he is wanted on a charge of being the murderer of Mrs. Frederick Covey.

"We're after the man who killed Mrs. Covey at North Plainfield," the man with the gun declared, "and we mean to get him if he's here. We've been searching all night and don't mean to let him get away now."

When the armed quartette became convinced that Grant was not on the train they withdrew. The most direct clue to the whereabouts of Grant was furnished at Smalleytown last night, when a twelve-year-old girl on a farm adjoining the Mernaugh farm, where Grant once had worked, said she saw Grant yesterday afternoon. He was riding on a bicycle, she said, and got off his wheel to talk to her. She said he went in the direction of Stirling.

Chief of Police Wiese, of North Plainfield, and a posse searched the swamps about Stirling today. Chief Kieley, of Plainfield, with several detectives, also searched the surrounding country today in automobiles in search of the fugitive.
