GIRLS STEAL TO GET RIDE

Many Philadelphia Stores Fleece in Response to Lure of Bubble Wagons.

Philadelphia, May 26—Wearing a stylish, tailor-made suit and a big Leghorn hat trimmed with sweeping black ostrich plumes, Lucretia Davis, twenty and pretty, was a prisoner in the city hall police station today. She is charged with using the names of prominent society women to fleece about 15 stores out of goods worth about \$2,000.

Love of fine clothing and a desire to enjoy automobile rides, together with sympathy for unfortunate friends are said to be the causes of the young woman's trouble. According to Acting Captain Souder she admitted this confessed to the truth of the charges, and made out a list of a score of society women whose names she employed.

Her mother died about a year ago and she said her home was broken up. She became acquainted with persons who took her on automobile rides and she became envious of the dress of some of the women she saw on such excursions.

Her methods, according to detectives, were very similar in each case. In ordering goods she always took some with her and left the remainder to be delivered.

She sold or pawned much of the goods thus obtained and used most of the money to maintain and enjoy herself. Her automobile trips, which were of the "joy ride" variety, were usually to Atlantic City and various places up the state.

DOG REVEALS GHASTLY MURDER

Crime Supposed to Be Work of Mafia. Fifteen Wounds on Body

New York May 25—A collie dog nosing around the outskirts of the Parkside woods, in the southeastern section of Flatbush, at dusk yesterday evening came upon the body of a man who had been murdered. Frederick and Hampton Anderson, brothers who own the dog, were attracted by the whining of the collie, and on perceiving what was the cause of its distress ran to Police Lieutenant Comboy and Patrolman McCormick, who were standing a couple of blocks away, at East Forty-first St. and Avenue D.

Hundreds of persons had spent the afternoon rambling through the woods, gathering wild flowers.

Fifteen wounds had been inflicted on the body with a stiletto. The man's nose was cut off, his right cheek had been sliced and seven long cuts had been made in the abdomen. Any one of the dozen wounds would have killed according to Dr. Flanagan of the Kingscounty hospital, who was called to view the body and who declared the murder had occurred about 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

CANNOT EXPLAIN PLAIN WRECK

N. & S. Officials Are of Opinion That Defect in Engine Tender Derailed Train

Norfolk Va. May 26—Officials of the Norfolk and Southern Railroad are still at a loss to explain the cause of the derailment of train No. 1 at Anderson's siding, near Hertford, N. C., which resulted in injury to twenty-one passengers Tuesday afternoon.

They believe however, that the accident was due to some defect in the trucks of the engine tender. The rails were recently laid, and are said to have been in perfect condition. A careful investigation so far has failed to show the cause.

The passengers who were carried to St. Vincent's and the Protestant Hospitals as a result of injuries they received in the wreck, all are reported to be in no danger, and improving rapidly. Several returned to their homes yesterday.

Sheldon Sanderlin, the 4-year-old son of Mrs. W. A. Sanderlin, of Belhaven, N. C. who was the most seriously hurt, has made rapid progress toward recovery, injuries about his head healing quickly.

A second examination showed that he had sustained neither a fractured skull nor internal injuries, as was at first feared.
