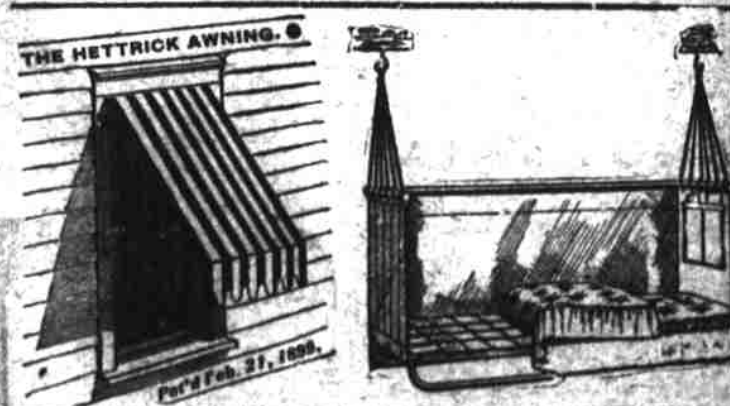

CUTS YOUNG
MAN'S THROAT

Excursionist Imbibes Too Freely
and Slashes Another With
Pocket Knife

Just after the excursion train which was run from Morehead City to Washington, N. C. yesterday had crossed over Neuse river bridge on its return trip, Mr. Thomas Styron of Morehead City was seriously cut on the throat with a knife in the hands of E. D. Buck a resident of Beaufort county.

Just how the trouble started could not be learned as none of the excursionists could give any particulars but it is supposed that Buck, who was under the influence of intoxicants, became offended at Mr. Styron's endeavors to quiet him and unexpectedly attacked him with a large Barlow knife.

Friends of the injured man dressed his wound as well as possible with the facilities at hand and upon the arrival of the train in this city he was hurried to a physician's office and given the proper medical attention. If no serious complications set in the wound it will doubtless heal within a few weeks.

Buck was arrested and carried to police headquarters where he was required to give bond of \$100.00 for his appearance at a preliminary hearing next Monday afternoon.
