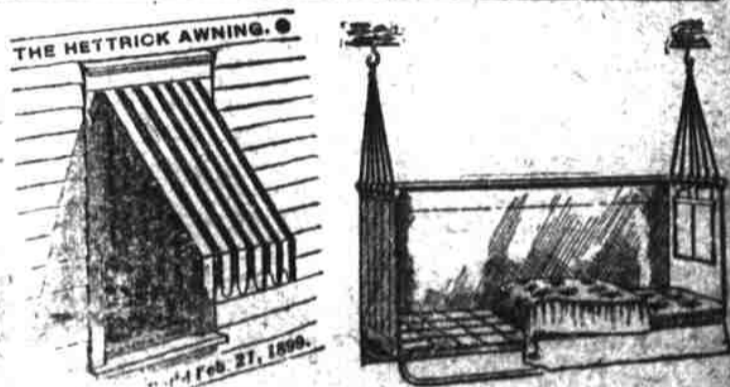

REBUKED BY LOVER TRIES SUICIDE

Richmond Woman Becomes Dependent and Attempts to End her Life.

Richmond Va. June 3.—Scorned and rebuked by the man whom she loved, believing herself without friends who could sympathize, and temporarily insane from grief and sorrow, Mrs. Elmore Wold, a trained nurse whose husband sank with the Battleship Maine many years ago, sat down on a bench in the Capitol Square, Wednesday night and deliberately swallowed sixteen grains of morphine.

Her unconscious form was found by a pedestrian and she was taken to her boarding house, No. 816 East Franklin street, where she was revived and where on Thursday she talked in an incoherent manner of the attempted suicide. She will recover.

Her attempted suicide in the Square was the second one for the day. In an office in Main street she had tried to end her life with a revolver. The man for whom she has such a mad infatuation dashed the pistol from her hand as she was in the act of sending a bullet crashing into her brain.

Silently the woman is said to have taken the rebuke from the person she loved and to have gone out into the street quietly and calmly. She left her boarding house in the evening and wandered to the Capitol Square. Several people saw her sitting on one of the benches but none thought she contemplated suicide. When no one was looking she swallowed the morphine and laid down to die. But for the fact that she was found and medical assistance rendered at once she would have likely accomplished her promise.
