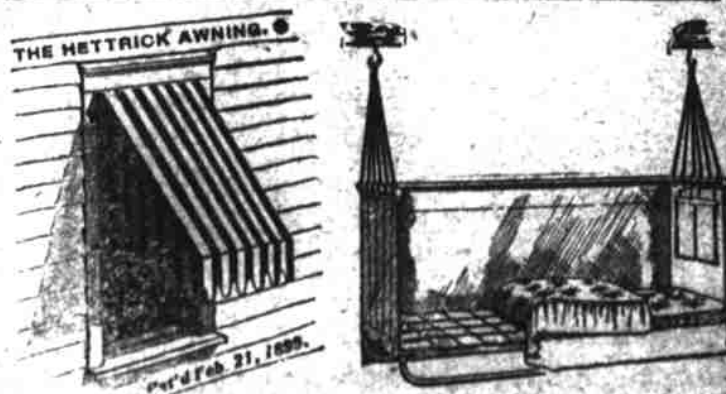

HUMAN BRAINS BEST FERTILIZER

Secretary Hays Declares That When Properly Used Great Crops Result

Crookston, Minn., June 4—Declaring the time is at hand when American farmers must mix brains and technical training with their work on the farm in order to get the most out of the soil, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture William M. Hays today addressed the Northern Minnesota Development Association here today.

"The world is looking on," said Professor Hays, "while the farmers plod along in our unorganized, unsystematic, half-hearted way, and the world believe that were our people broader and better trained, we could produce much better yields than we do, and we are forced to believe that the world is right. Whether our activity be religious, social, political, or economic, we are on the 15 bushel basis with a 25 bushel opportunity."

Professor Hays declared that the agricultural high school at Crookston was the nucleus of the cure for these troubles. He advocated the extension of the consolidated rural school's idea throughout Minnesota—the institutions where farming is taught in addition to the "three R's."

PROCLAMATION BY THE GOVERNOR

Issues Call Convening General Assembly in Extra Session on Tuesday June 14th.

Raleigh June 4—To the Honorable the General Assembly of North Carolina:

By and with the advice of the Council of State, an extraordinary session having arisen, I, W. W. Kitchin, Governor of the State of North Carolina, in the exercise of the power conferred on me by the Constitution of the State, do issue this my proclamation convening the General Assembly in extra session on Tuesday, the 14th day of June, 1910, at 11 o'clock a. m., and do hereby notify and request the Senators and the members of the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of North Carolina to meet in their respective halls, in the Capitol in the City of Raleigh at said time, for the purpose of considering the emergency resulting from the inability of the State Treasurer to sell in accordance with Chapter 390, Public Law 1909, entitled "An Act to authorize the issue of State bonds to pay off the State bonds which fall due on the first day of July, 1910," sufficient bonds to pay the present outstanding bonds of the issue of 1880, which mature on July 1, 1910, and of enacting legislation to enable the State Treasurer to secure sufficient funds to pay said last mentioned bonds at their maturity.

For information of the members of General Assembly all State papers are requested to publish notice of the proclamation.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State to be affixed. Done in the city of Raleigh this the third day of June, 1910.
