EASTERN ROADS ARE NOW UNEASY

No Suit Has Been Brought Again Them But They Fear Big Stick

Washington D. C. June 8.—Facing another railroad conference today, President Taft devoted himself to studying the Eastern rate situation, hoping to obtain an agreement from the Eastern roads similar to that reached with the Western lines last night.

It is confidently expected by the administration that there will be little difficulty in persuading the representatives of the Eastern line to agree.

Today's conference will be of greater scope than that of yesterday, for on its result will depend definitely the attitude of the great eastern trunk lines, and probably all of the others lines in the country. Yesterday's agreement covered only the twenty five roads in the Western Traffic Association.

President Brown, of the New York Central, and President McCrea, of the Pennsylvania, are two of the eastern committee, who arranged today's White House conference. Brown has already announced that he favors an agreement similar to that reached by the Western road. President Underwood, of the Erie, who was expected, also declared in favor of such a settlement.

To the Eastern roads, however, the government has nothing to offer in return. The department of justice has neither enjoined the proposed rate increase nor filed suit under the Sherman anti-trust law. A threat of prosecution is the only club in the hands of president in the Eastern situation.

New York June 8.—The cotton market was dull and featureless today, fluctuations being confined within yesterday's narrow ranges. The near months were strong particularly August, in which there was some heavy short covering by western houses. Market quotations over nearly the entire belt are almost ideal for the new crop. Trade interests seem to be doing very little in the market. Spot sales were only eighteen hundred bales today at unchanged prices.

His pure thoughts were borne like fumes of sacred incense o'er the clouds

And wafted thence on angels' wings through ways of light to the bright source of all.

He came as near being an ideal gentleman as any man who ever lived, courtly in his manners, with all the culture of the schools, polished with the refining influences of the most elegant society, possessing in an eminent degree the glowing characteristics and shining virtues of a true knight of the age of chivalry, which were real and substantial virtues, such as courtesy to the low, respect to the high, tenderness to the softer sex, loyalty to the prince, courage and piety, gentleness and modesty, veracity and frankness. There are many virtues though Byron says, "Cervantes smiled Spain's chivalry away."

The remains will arrive in this city from Goldsboro this morning and the funeral exercises will be concluded from the First Baptist church by Rev. Chas. L. Greaves this afternoon at 4 o'clock.

Mr. Clark is survived by his father, two brothers and four sisters.

PUBLIC WATERWAYS HEARING

Before Corps Engineers U. S. Army, Large Local Interest Shown

The local interest in deeper water at and below New Bern was seen in the large attendance at the public meeting held at the court house yesterday morning. The Corps of Engineers of the U. S. Army, Lieut. Col. W. C. Longitt Major Herbert Deekyns, Major W. J. Borden and Capt. Earl I. Brown gave earnest attention while a number of the leading merchants spoke and showed by facts and figures, the commercial needs of government help in giving this city a ten foot water depth at mean low water from this city to the sea.

Col. James A. Bryan presided over the meeting, opening the session by reading a nearly exhaustive article of facts and statistics in behalf of the Chamber of Commerce. Presentation of New Bern's water needs were ably shown by Messrs. G. N. Ives, C. L. Ives, C. D. Bradham, Capt. Geo. Wallace, Clyde Eby, T. A. Green, L. I. Moore, C. E. Foy, and Cap. N. W. Jones. The government's committee made inquiries of each speaker, and gained an immense amount of inside information, which all tended to prove the needs of the ten foot channel as asked for.
