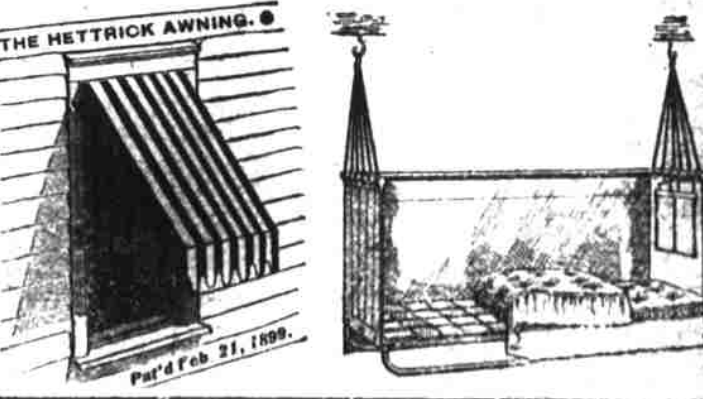

Senator Simmons and myself this morning invited Honorable Hannis Taylor to deliver oration at New Bern's Bi-Centennial celebration. He accepts. Later will invite Swiss Minister and German Ambassador.

This means that New Bern's most distinguished son will visit his birthplace and deliver the Bi-Centennial oration. Dr. Taylor was Minister to Spain during Cleveland's administration. He is regarded as one of the greatest law writers of America. For his magnificent work on the English Constitution the great Universities of Europe conferred upon him honorary degrees rarely ever conferred upon an American. His expected visit will be looked forward to with interest.

Last Sunday the carnival arrived in this city and on Monday the young man again applied to the manager for a position. This time however he was told that there was no vacancy and that they could not use him.

The young man did not take this refusal as final and during the past few days has visited the grounds several times in search of work which, however he was not successful in securing.

Last Wednesday night the young man was found in an unconscious condition in the northern part of the city. He was carried into a nearby house where he was partially revived and stated that he had suffered an attack of vertigo. After making this statement he again lapsed into unconsciousness and did not become rational until morning. Capt. Stern, the local manager of the American Salvation Army called on the young man yesterday morning and administered sacrament to him.

The physician who was called in stated that the young man has small chances for recovery.

## YOUNG MAN DROWNED

Joseph Ingraham Mysteriously Falls Overboard From Gas Boat Brevard

Wednesday night as the gas boat Fannie Brevard, Captain Noah Lee, master, was returning from a trip to this port, a young man, named Joseph Ingraham, who worked on the boat fell overboard and was drowned.

A cargo of potatoes had been brought up from Dawson's Creek had been discharged and the boat was returning when near the mouth of Goose Creek a wild scream for help was heard and Joe Ingraham has not been seen since.

The boat was stopped immediately but the night being very dark and the wind blowing briskly it was impossible to locate the drowning man, and even yesterday there was a good deal of uncertainty about just where the accident occurred.

Captain Lee hastened on down to Wilkinson's Point where the Revenue Cutter was lying borrowed a lot of tackle and returned yesterday to drag for the body but about the middle of the afternoon a report reached here that the search had so far been unsuccessful.

Mr. Ingraham was a native of Beaufort county where his mother still lives, but he has been residing in the neighborhood of Arapahoe several months. It is said that he was a young man of most excellent character, industrious steady and very pious, all of which made him many friends where he was known.

Another pathetic side to this unfortunate drowning is the fact that the young man was to be married next week to a worthy young lady of near Arapahoe.

No theory can be advanced as to what caused the accident, unless in passing from one part of the boat to the another in the darkness, the young man stumbled and fell overboard.

### New Depot Soon

Many people who have noticed the two sections of roof placed on the brick walls that remain after the fire in Norfolk-Southern Railroad shops have wondered at the peculiar construction and the opening left in the roof between the different parts. This is explained by the fact that this work is merely temporary and these roofs were erected solely for the purpose of protecting the rolling stock which is brought in for repairs. All those walls and buildings will later be removed, and the ground will be occupied by tracks and switches which are required to accommodate the increasing business of this road, and as an approach to the new union station. In this connection it may be stated that a representative of the railway is now in the city with the nearly completed plans for this magnificent structure and when the work is once begun it will be pushed to a finish.

It may not be known to everyone that all that large tract of land lying between Griffith street and the river and partly occupied by the Congdon Mill now belongs to the Norfolk-Southern Railroad Company, and that upon this property will be located the railroad shops and other departments.
