LOVERS QUARREL; BOTH DEAD

The Bodies of Man and Woman Found in Chicago—He Was Married

Chicago, June 10—A murder and suicide with love as the motive, were revealed today by the discovery of the body of Frank L. Campbell, about 500 feet from a lone spot, where Miss Lena Hansen was found slain last night.

Miss Hansen was found dead three blocks from her home, two bullet wounds near her heart. There was no sign of a robbery or struggle. This morning Campbell's body was discovered, also with two bullet holes near the heart and by his side a revolver carrying four empty cartridges.

Police investigation disclosed that Campbell had been devoted to Miss Hansen. She discovered that he was married and told him that his attentions must cease. Campbell, the police say, followed Miss Hansen when she left her work last night and when she again rejected his attention, shot her dead and later committed suicide.
