DETECTIVE LOOKED AS ROBBER WORKED

Negro Woman Pickpocket Arrested After Having Stealthily Stolen Money

Richmond, Va. Jan. 11.—Thomas Mc Mahon, chief of the detective bureau, watched Lou Charity, a notorious negro pickpocket, steal small purses from chateleine bags belonging to Mrs. B. M. Robertson and Mrs. J. Wallace Snellings, of South Richmond, and as a result of the clever work on the part of the sleuth the negro is behind bars in the second police station upon three charges, a conviction upon either one of which will mean her incarceration for several years in the penitentiary.

Standing near the counter where the two ladies were making purchases was the negro woman. Directly behind her was Chief McMahon, who had suspected Lou Charity of being the person who for the past month or so has stolen from various shoppers in Broad street. The ladies carried their chateleine bags on their arms, and in each bag was a small purse containing their money.

While the ladies were engaged in looking at some particular sample of cloth or article they intended buying the negro woman would stealthily approach them, deftly twisted open their purses. The small purse on the inside would be extracted the chateleine bag would click and the pickpocket would be gone.

Twice she worked the same game in a department store in Broad street Friday morning, and each time Chief McMahon was standing within two feet of her, on one occasion looking over her shoulders and witnessing the theft.

The negro woman was placed under arrest and will be arraigned Saturday morning as a suspicious character and upon two other more serious charges, each accusing her of stealing from the person. There is a difference of opinion at this time as to whether or not the negro can be convicted of a felony, the money in the purses she stolen not aggregating \$50.

Was Held in High Esteem by His Colleagues

While talking with R. A. Nunn yesterday about the late W. W. Clark he said:

Mr. Clark's industry, his talent and easy conversation, as well as the skill with which he tried his cases, soon made his abilities known and his reputation attracted the best class of business. I do not recall any very important case which has been tried at this bar within the last twenty years in which Mr. Clark did not appear. His courtesy to other lawyers was unfeigned. While every case was a combat he wasted no energy in preliminaries but when the light was on he allowed no quarter. His patience with young lawyers was great. He wished them all well and it is no envy when they succeeded. He was one of the greatest lawyers intellectually this town has had. His preparation was complete. His statements were clear and transparent. His illustrations were striking, the words with which he enriched his arguments were full of meaning. His arguments went straight to the intellect of the judges and carried conviction with them. It was a delight to lawyers to hear him discuss law. I do not say he was wisest nor the greatest lawyer that I have known in my time, but I do say that in my experience I have never heard nor read in supreme court decisions nor in text books propositions of law expounded with the clearness, force and attractiveness, as they were by Mr. W. W. Clark. We shall not soon see his like again."

MONEY FOR OUR RIVERS

Big results of Efforts Simmons and Thomas For East Carolina.

Washington, D. C. June 11.—Through the active work of Senator Simmons and Congressman Thomas the third North Carolina Congressional district secures following items river and harbor bill now passed by house and senate.

Carteret County: Maintenance of harbor at Beaufort and Beaufort inlet, twelve thousand five hundred dollars; New survey Carteret Island Slough by way Taylors Creek; new survey of Cape Lookout harbor of refuge as commercial harbor or harbor for supplies for vessels; improving Morehead City harbor in front of town of Morehead City, nineteen thousand dollars; construction of channel from Inland Waterway to town of Beaufort, by way of Gallants channel, twenty seven thousand six hundred and seventy six dollars. Any balance to be used for turning basin in front of Beaufort.

Pamlico County: Improving Bay river twenty one thousand dollars. Improving Smiths Creek at Oriental, sixteen thousand two hundred and fifty dollars, Craven and Jones counties; Improving Neuse and Trent rivers; for maintenance, to include securing depth of four feet in Trent river from New Bern to Trenton thirty-six thousand dollars; improving Conteneva Creek two thousand dollars, improving Swift Creek, to Vanceboro, according to engineers report, one thousand six hundred dollars, survey of Core Creek to improve Navigation up to Core Creek landing.

Onslow County: Improving New river and waterways to Beaufort N. C. twenty-three thousand seven hundred dollars, of which sum six thousand seven hundred dollars to be expended upon New river making depth of five feet to Jacksonville.

Duplin, Sampson and Pender counties improvement North east, Black rivers, and Cape Fear seven thousand dollars.

There is also included in the Omnibus Light House bill two thousand five hundred dollars for Range Lights on Bogue Sound, in all there are one hundred and sixty seven thousand four third district.

Kitchen Withdraws Call

Raleigh, N. C. dispatch, June 11.—Governor Kitchin today withdrew his call for a special session of the Legislature June 14, the emergency which prompted the call, issued several days ago, having been met.

The purpose of the session was to provide means for taking up a balance of \$2,127,500 on a refunding of the bond issue of \$5,500,000 due January 1. On Thursday the American Tobacco Company took one million dollars of the new four per cent bonds at par and today bankers are business men of North Carolina met Governor Kitchin by invitation in the State capitol and in 40 minutes subscribed the remaining \$1,127,500 and \$65,000 additional.
