Despite the fact that the weather yesterday was very inclement quite a large shipment of potatoes was made to northern markets from this city. The shippers inform us that the price remains firm and that the demand is good.

Mr. H. E. Royal received a telegram yesterday conveying the sad intelligence of the death, at Mount Olive, of Miss Annie Royal, a cousin of his. Miss Royal was a bright and interesting girl of about 13 or 14 years, and was greatly loved in her home.

In the police court yesterday afternoon Elizabeth Reid and Alice Clark, two dusky damsels who inhabit the section around Five Points were given a hearing on a warrant charging them with being disorderly. They were found guilty and fined \$2 and the cost. Noah Hobbs, also colored was fined \$5 and cost for the same offense.
