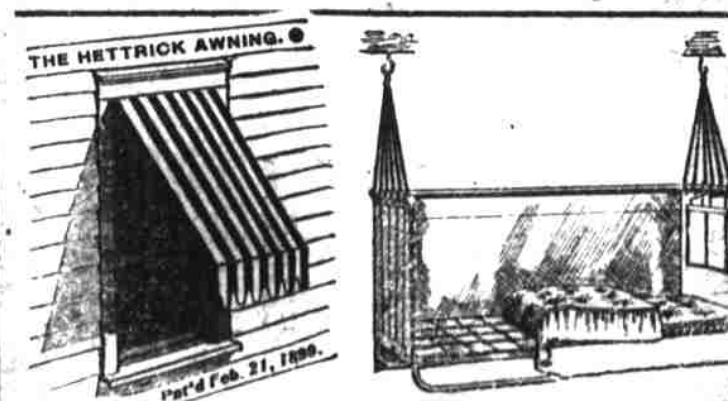

Special to Journal. New York, June 23—Reports of scattered rains in Southern Texas and parts of Oklahoma, caused the cotton market to open down this morning, and some southern selling was noted. Prices then rallied moderately on short covering and the market turned dull.

If Texas and Oklahoma get good rains this week, the market is expected to work lower, otherwise a sharp rally is likely.

Spot sales 13,000 bales at fifteen points decline from yesterday.

### Installs New Massage Machine.

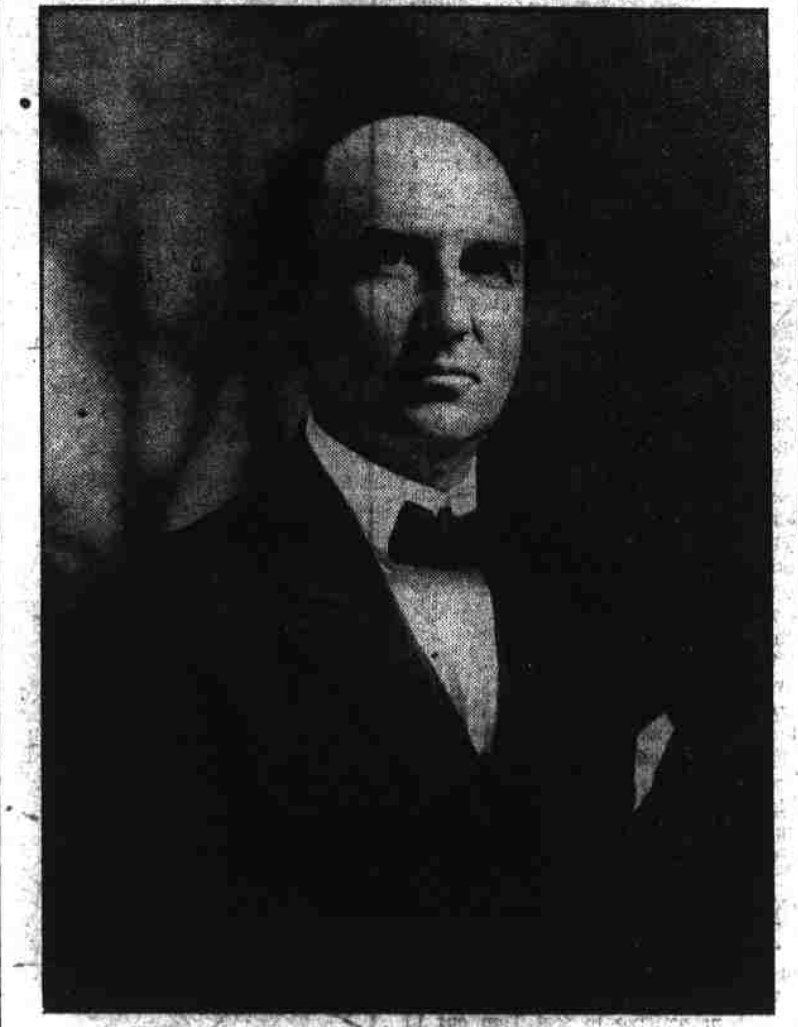

## A WORD PERSONAL TO DEMOCRATIC VOTERS

### Joseph E. Robinson, A Congressional Candidate In Race To The Finish.

It has come to me that a rumor is being circulated throughout this congressional district to the effect that I am no longer a candidate for the nomination for Congress. Such a statement is absolutely without foundation in truth and is a deliberate fabrication of the person who first put it forth.

Without further comment, let me say that I am in the race to the finish and can be retired only by the people of the district in convention assembled whose prerogative it is to name the candidate. I have strictly adhered to this principle of recognizing the sovereignty of the people, and from the time I first published my announcement—last August; before any other candidate had an-

nounced himself—to the present I have demeaned myself accordingly. I have importuned no one, either in person or by correspondence, nor have I presumed to speak for any other candidate, either to interpret his motion—to the effect that "he is running in the interest of another"—or to forecast his purpose—to the effect that "he is no longer a candidate," or that "he will retire before the convention convenes."

I will appreciate whatever vote the district sees fit to give me, and if that vote is sufficient to nominate me I will serve the Democracy of the district in Congress to the best of my ability.

### Canning at Home.
