NO WHISKEY ON THIS SHIP

Don't Even Work Sunday Except to Make Money.—In Norfolk Harbor.

Norfolk, Va., June 25.—Probably the first prohibition ship that ever hit this port, so far as the natives are aware, is the British steamer Damara.

No whiskey or any other intoxicating drinks are permitted on the ship, except when used for medicinal purposes. Also, the crew of this model vessel does not work on Sunday in any part except in cases of absolute necessity.

The Damara is one of fifty-five vessels owned by the firm of McClay & McIntyre. Mr. McClay is a religious man and is careful that men he employs on vessels owned by the company are sober, and he is very strict regarding the enforcement of the rule forbidding Sunday work on any of his ships.

Captain Francis Stewart, commanding the Damara, said yesterday that no liquor is permitted on ships owned by McClay & McIntyre, except to be used in cases of sickness, and that crews on ships of the company do not work Sunday unless it's a question of loading or unloading, in order to comply with a contract, or where a time charter calls for the docking or undocking of a vessel on Sunday.
