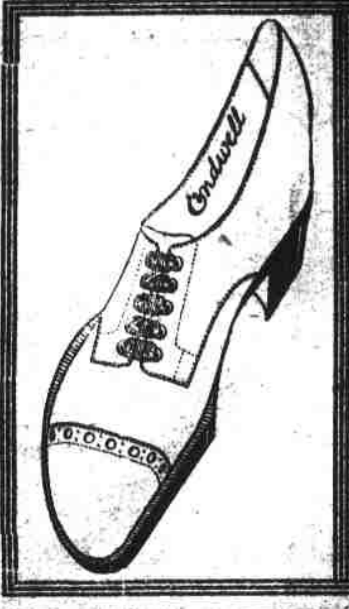

FINDS DAUGHTER DROWNED IN TUB

In Attempting to Take a Bath Two Year Old Girl Falls in Tub and Loses Her Life.

Foehontas, July 1.—When Mrs. J. N. Meadows entered the kitchen of her Powell street home Wednesday afternoon, after an absence of barely three minutes she found her two-year-old daughter drowned in a wash tub.

The mother had been busy at the tub and was called from the room for a few minutes. Before leaving she removed the clothes from the water, leaving the big tub little more than half-filled.

Her child had been playing about the room while Mrs. Meadows was carrying on her work. When she was called to another part of the house the parent gave not a thought to the safety of the child.

The little tot had evidently climbed upon a table and was splashing the water in the tub, which was resting upon a chair. How the child tumbled into the water is not known.

After a few minutes absence Mrs. Meadows returned to her work and found the body of her child completely submerged.

Though the case was hopeless medical aid was summoned, but physicians worked in vain to restore life.

Remarkable Coincidences

There died in northern part county a few days ago a woman in whose long life, she being more than 80 years old, the most important events occurred on Sunday. Six children were the fruit of their union and each of these was born on Sunday morning. These had been no death in the family until Sunday June 19th when she succumbed to an attack of typhoid fever.

Trinity College Showing

The catalogue of the school of Education recently established at Trinity College has just been issued. This school has a strong faculty of fifteen men, and offers courses that will give teachers throughout the State an opportunity to prepare themselves for high school work. The curriculum covers two years, and the courses are so arranged that teachers can take ten hours in academic course, five hours in high school methods and administration, and three hours in the science of teaching. The Trinity Park School and the Durham City Schools offer the very best opportunity for teachers to study high school work.

Hon. J. Y. Joyner, Superintendent of Public Instruction, writing of the Education at Trinity College, says:

"I am much pleased and encouraged by this important step of the college in enlarging its school of Education, and in providing such a valuable course for the preparation of teachers in scholarship and professional education. This means for such preparation have been inadequate, especially for the preparation of men, either to the needs of the demand of the public and private schools of the State. I am confident that such a course of study as I outlined here will add greatly to the service of the college and will be a distinct and most valuable contribution to the advancement of education in this State."

Special bearing attachments are being made for both men and women. No charge will be made for tuition.

TOO MUCH ILLICIT GOVERNMENT

So It would Appear On Local Indifference to Law.

Washington, D. C. July 1.—Commissioner of Internal Revenue Cahill recently gave orders dispatching eight agents to Oklahoma, Tennessee and North Carolina to assist in enforcing the laws against illicit distilling. Reports received at the Bureau show the greatest extent to which the business has developed in these States of the South and Southwest, which local prohibition laws have relegated to "dry" territory.

Mr. Cahill says there is more illicit distilling now than ever known before in the States referred to.

The field force has been increased to the limit of the appropriation. Band-ups of moonshine outfits are frequent and a count kept recently showed that five agents or deputies had been shot in a period of sixty days.

The government officials labor under considerable difficulty in making arrests because of the indifference of the people in the localities affected to set in the capacity of informers or to give practical assistance in capturing the person in the illicit business.

Steamer Strikes Albemarle Bridge

The train from Norfolk was about 20 minutes late yesterday afternoon on account of an accident which occurred yesterday morning at the new bridge which was recently built across Albemarle Sound. From the few details that could be learned in regard to the matter it seems that in attempting to pass through one of the draws in the bridge a steam tug struck one of the main supports and a section of the bridge was knocked down. This was repaired though in time to let the afternoon train pass over.

"Death to counterfeit. One hundred dollars. No. 7,194. State of North Carolina."

This bill entitles the bearer to receive one hundred Spanish mill's dollars or the value thereof in gold or silver, agreeable to an act of assembly passed at New Bern the 10th day of May 1798. The imprint of the engraver is dated 1790, this would make the relic 120 years old.

Mastodon Being Mounted.

"Another big skeleton is now being mounted up by Curator H. H. Brimley in the State Museum. It is a mastodon skeleton that is being put together from the bones of two of these huge animals found in Jones and Onslow counties.

A task was recently sent to Curator Brimley from Onslow county and he sent Assistant Curator T. W. Addicks after the rest of the skeleton. Some of it Mr. Addicks has dug out of the swamp lands and hearing of another specimen in Jones county, he went there, where he is now digging up the bones.

The mastodon was a huge animal of the size of an ordinary elephant, and in years gone by was to be found in Eastern North Carolina, though now extinct. Its bones are huge ones, and when it is stated that one of the teeth sent to Curator Brimley weighs 6.14 pounds, the size of the animal can be appreciated. Mr. Brimley hopes to be able to make up one skeleton from the bones dug out by Mr. Addicks.
