Special to Journal. Goldsboro, N. C., July 2. Telegraphic returns from the various counties in the Third Congressional District give Hon. Geo. E. Hood of this city the following vote on the first ballot in the congressional convention, that convened in Goldsboro Tuesday July 28th. Capt. J. B. Pamlico 6, Jones 5, Craven 5, Sampson 15, Wayne 34. Pender not instructed, but he will likely get 5 from this county making a total of 97 voters. Mr. Hood gets Robinson's 11 votes from Wayne which are not antagonistic, he will lack only 5 votes of being nominated on first ballot 113 necessary to a choice.

Death of Merritt Whitley.

The death Saturday afternoon of Merritt Whitley, marked the passing of one of New Bern's most worthy and highly esteemed colored citizens. His sickness was only of a few days duration, but was severe from the beginning. The deceased was about 60 years of age and leaves a widow, two sons and four daughters. By industry and thrift Whitley worked his way up from apprentice boy at the carpenter's trade to a substantial position in the community. He gave all his children a good practical education, and one son, the late Dr. C. C. Whitley, was a college graduate, and had built up a large medical practice when he was stricken and soon succumbed to the "great white plague" in the prime of his early manhood. The whole community can but deplore the loss of this good colored citizen.

Will Go into Camp This Month.

Military circles throughout the State are interested in the approaching summer maneuvers which will be held shortly. The Coast Artillery Corps will gather with the Regulars at Fort Caswell August 5th to 15th. The Third Infantry will gather at Camp Glenn, Morehead City, July 9th to 18th, and the Second Infantry at the same place July 19th to 28th. These two regiments will be drilled principally in field instruction and rifle practice and it is expected that many of the State companies will be engaged.

The Coast Artillery Corps of the State, as last year, will meet with Uncle Sam's regulars at Fort Caswell in August. The maneuvers will be in charge of the army officers stationed at the fort. The exercises will consist of rifle and gun practice, field and patrol movements, and general exercises as regards field movements. It is also possible that there will be several short battles held during the maneuvers.
