SHORT PASSING EVENTS

Miss Lena Wills has gone for a visit at Virginia Beach, Va.

Thursday was the high temperature day of the summer thus far, the registration being 94 degrees.

Yesterday was another dull day in the Police Court. There were only one or two minor cases on the docket and these were quickly disposed of.

Tomorrow night at 8 o'clock Capt. Stern will give a lecture on his work in the Chinatown district of New York. The public is cordially invited to attend.

Christ Church—Seventh Sunday after Trinity, holy communion at 7:45 a. m.; morning service with sermon at 11 a. m.; evening service with sermon at 8 p. m.; Sunday school at 6 o'clock p. m. The services will be conducted by the Rev. Claudius F. Smith, of Elizabeth City.

The work of paving Craven street was begun yesterday morning. A large force of brick layers are employed by the contractors who have charge of this work and they are making rapid progress. The section of Broad between Middle and Craven streets will be taken up next.

Judging from all reports the Third Regiment of North Carolina troops that is in camp at Camp Glenn, is enjoying its outing immensely. The boys arrived at Morehead City early Thursday morning and at once began erecting their tents. They will remain in camp for ten days.

Home grown watermelons will soon make their appearance on the local market. A visitor to the city yesterday from Pamlico county informed the writer that the outlook for a large yield of melons in his section of the county was very encouraging and that they would soon be large enough to bring to market.

Quite a large number of delegates from this city will go down to Morehead City today to attend the Third District Judicial Convention which is to be held there today. The Norfolk Southern Railroad will also operate a special train from Farmville to Morehead City in order to accommodate the large number of delegates from that section.

The work of making the excavations for the new Union passenger depot is now in full swing and is progressing rapidly. Material is being brought in each day and the brick layers will soon be able to begin their work. The foundations of the structure will be built of concrete and will be so constructed that no amount of weight will cause it to sway.

Several expert decorators will arrive in this city next week and begin work on the floats that are to be used in the parades during the Bi-Centennial Celebration. Up to the present time about twenty floats have been entered and it is more than probable that others will be entered later. These parades will be one of the main features of the celebration.

Mr. R. D. W. Connor of Raleigh, is again in the city in the interest of the Bi-Centennial Celebration. He says that in every town that he has visited during the past few days the people have talked very enthusiastically of the event and many signified their intention of attending. The committee regret very much that Raleigh will not be able to participate.

A shipment of several barrels of Irish potatoes passed through this city yesterday morning enroute to Northern markets. The shipment during the past few days have been exceedingly small on account of the risk taken by the shipper in securing enough money from then to even pay for the freight. The quotations at the present time range from \$2.50 to \$2.75 per barrel.

A party which was composed of a number of ladies and gentlemen went down to Wilkersons Point yesterday in an open gas boat to spend the day in fishing. While returning home late yesterday afternoon they encountered a heavy shower and despite the fact that a number of tarpaulins were brought into use the party was thoroughly drenched when they reached the city.

An enormous amount of work is being turned out just at this time by the mechanics and mechanics at the Norfolk Southern Railroad shops in this city. Discarded passenger cars are being rebuilt, disabled locomotives being repaired and re-painted and much other work being done. It is not probable that any other shop in the State gets out so much work with the facilities afforded.

In walking around in different sections of the city it is noticed that there are a number of billboards which are in the last stages of dilapidation and decay. One of these structures is located right near the City Hall and much comment has been made about it during the past few days. A well built board is laid enough but one that looks as if it were built in ante-bellum days is a nuisance and should be torn down.

A number of the local prize fight enthusiasts are greatly perturbed over the mayor's action in prohibiting the picture of the fight being shown in this city and several have gone so far as to put up a wager that the picture will be shown regardless of the action, but it almost certainly will not be shown on the grounds of the city. The picture was shown at the city hall and the mayor's action is a nuisance and should be torn down.

task of erecting several thousand small electric lights which was begun a few weeks ago, and within a few days they will be attached to the feed wires and the current turned on to ascertain whether they are all properly connected. It is probable that after this has been done it will be found necessary to place a few more strings of the lights at various points in order to make these places show up as well as the others.

During the rain storm yesterday afternoon one of the strings of electric lights which had been erected on Middle street for illumination during the Bi-Centennial celebration, was twisted from its fastenings and fell to the ground. People passing that point gave it a wide berth as they doubtless thought the wires were heavily charged with electricity. This however, was not the case as the current has not yet been turned on this section. The wires were later taken up and wrapped around a nearby post.

Shortly after 6 o'clock yesterday evening one of the wires which furnishes electricity to all of the small lights in the downtown district fell to the ground at the corner of Middle and Pollock streets and instantly all of these lights were extinguished. A force of the electricians employed by the company were at once sent out to repair the break, but more than two hours elapsed before the electricity could be turned on. Working in mid-air straddle two swaying wires is no easy matter and it is very perilous especially in wet weather but this is what it was found necessary to do, and a large crowd soon gathered to watch the proceedings.
