MAY SWEEP OUT SUPPLIES BUREAU

Many Changes to Fellow Forces Retirement to Rear Admiral Capps.

Washington, D. C., July 14.—The forced retirement of Rear Admiral Washington Lee Capps, Chief Constructor of the Navy—the second official bombshell exploded by Secretary Meyer within two months—is but the beginning of a cleaning out of the Bureau of Construction and Repairs, just as the resignation of Rear Admiral Rogers was merely the beginning of the overhauling of the personnel of the Bureau of Supplies and Accounts.

These two Bureaus have been the centers of the staff officers of controversy for line officers for several years. Subordinate officers of the construction corps are on the anxious seat today waiting to see what will become of them. It is certain that several of Admiral Capps' chief henchmen, Assistant Naval Constructors in the Bureau at the Department will receive orders within the next few days which will send them to posts so far removed from headquarters that they will be unable to continue the staff fight.

The successor of Admiral Capps has not been chosen, but announcement will not be made of his appointment for several weeks. He is a member of Construction Corps at present not on duty at the Bureau at Washington. He will come to Washington about August 1 but will not take charge of the Bureau until the resignation of Admiral Capps takes effect on October 1.

The end to the long line and staff controversy seems to be here. Rear Admirals Capps and Rogers were the only two high ranking officials who championed the staff cause. Unless Congress chooses to revise the matter at the next session it is believed that the fight will end for want of leadership.

23 Autos in This County.

According to statistics given out by the Corporation clerk in the Department of State, there are in North Carolina 1,680 automobiles, with the exception of a few in New Hanover county which are exempted from registration.

Of this number Craven county contributes 23 machines. Estimated at a fair average these 23 machines represent an expenditure of about \$30,000.

Heat Wave Abating.

Press reports received yesterday stated that the intense heat wave which prevailed in the eastern section of the United States during the first part of the week had considerably abated. The heavy rain which fell in this city during the early part of the day lowered the temperature several degrees and no discomfort was experienced by New Bern citizens.

Third Regiment Band Will Furnish Music.

The Third North Carolina Regiment Band, of Raleigh, has been engaged by the committee on arrangements to furnish the music for the Bi-Centennial celebration. This band is composed of about 20 pieces and is said to be the best in the state. The boys will arrive in this city Sunday evening, July 24th, so as to be on hand to assist in the preliminaries which will be held Monday.

Were Not Properly Attired

Several young white boys were given a hearing before Mayor McCarthy yesterday afternoon on a warrant charging them with bathing in Neuse river without being attired in the proper regalia. All of the boys pleaded guilty to the charge but owing to the fact that this was their first offense and upon their promise to never again violate the ordinance in regards to this particular they were dismissed.

REFUSE TO FREE LYNCHERS ON BAIL

Ohio Governor Says They Must Be Sent to Electric Chair or Penitentiary.

Newark, O., July 14.—Anxiety prevails today following the refusal to bail ten persons, charged with participating in the mob outrage and lynching last Friday night, and the announcement that the prisoners are to face the grand jury next Monday on the charge of first degree of murder. The ten prisoners came from every walk of life. The last to be placed in the county jail is a prominent politician.

Attorney General Denman will take personal charge of the grand jury investigation, and endeavor to carry out the written declaration of Governor Harmon that every member of the mob must be sent to the penitentiary or electrocuted, according to the measure of his guilt. More arrests were promised today.

It became known today that affidavits and evidence charging Newark officials with misconduct in office have been sent to Cleveland, and locked in the vaults of the detective agency, whose operations, it is believed, for the Anti-Saloon League resulted in the lynching of Carl Etherington. Harry Bradbury, head of the bureau, said to-day that the evidence compiled is appalling. It will be held until Governor Harmon calls for it.

The trip will be made on the torpedo boat DuPont now in charge of the North Carolina Division of the Naval Reserves. Lieutenant Winfield A. Worth is very proud that he will be able to take charge of the big war boat and fill every post with a member of the local company—something which no other company in the State has ever done.

STATE DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION

Hon. W. R. Allen, Nominated for Associate Justice Supreme Court. Other Nominations by Acclamation.

Charlotte, N. C. July 14.—The Democratic State Convention was called to order today by Chairman Eller at 12.18 o'clock.

There was good representation from all parts of the state, every county being represented except Tyrrell and Clay.

United States Senator Lee S. Overman was made temporary chairman, and delivered an address of thirty minutes duration are Democratic issues, State and National which was received with frequent and hearty applause.

At 1.30 the convention took a recess until 3 o'clock.

The afternoon session was begun by perfecting the permanent organization.

Those on the several committees from Third District are as follows:—Credentialed, H. E. Faison, Duplin; organization A. D. Ward, Craven; platform, L. I. Moore, Craven; executive, T. D. Warren, Craven, W. B. Hargett, Jones, W. M. Capps, Onslow, A. B. Croon, Jr., Pender, H. A. Grady, Sampson and Nathan, O'Berry Wayne.

Committee on Permanent Organization reported Walter B. Moore, of Jackson county, Chairman, and C. C. Daniels, of Wilson, Secretary.

The nomination of Chief Justice Walter Clark and Associate Justice Platt D. Walker was by acclamation, not a dissenting voice. A ballot was taken to decide the contest between Hons. W. R. Allen and J. S. Manning for the remaining Associate Justiceship, resulting in a vote of 514 for Allen and 451 for Manning.

For Corporation Commissioners H. C. Brown was nominated by acclamation, for the short term, and W. T. Lee, of Haywood, on the first ballot, for the long term, the vote standing, W. T. Lee 527, A. W. Graham, 314, J. H. Pearson, 121.

The convention then adjourned for supper to meet again at 9:30 to adopt the platform.

Judge D. L. Ward has resigned as judge of the third district, and Governor Kitchin has appointed H. W. Whedbee, of Greenville, his successor. Judge Ward was appointed some time ago to fill the unexpired term of Judge Guion, resigned, but in the convention was defeated by Mr. Whedbee for the nomination.
