KINSTON'S FLOAT AT NEW BERN

An Attractive Design Representing a Garden Scene With Persons Showing Richard Oswell in Various Stages of His Career

Kinston, N. C., July 25.—Kinston's float which will appear in the grand parade at the Bi-Centennial celebration in New Bern Tuesday, is being built at Pate's cabinet shop, under the auspices of the Daughters of the Confederacy. The design decided upon will be a garden scene with persons in it representing Richard Oswell the first continental governor of North Carolina, in the various stages of his career. The float will be decorated in evergreens and the costumes will be colonial style. The costumes have been ordered from Baltimore and will arrive this evening.

It is very fitting that two persons taking prominent part in this picture are direct descendants of Governor Caswell, Mr. Billy Bond, Jr. who is great-great-grandson of the governor, will represent him as a civil engineer and carry a compass that was used in the seventeenth century. Mr. Charley Cummings will take the part of Richard Caswell as brigadier general and Mr. J. C. Dall will represent him as statesman. Mr. Frank Hill will portray the character of governor.

Representing the present day, Miss Ruth Bond, than whom North Carolina can boast no fairer young lady, and who is a grand daughter three times removed from Governor Caswell will have a place in the front of the float with an old time sun dial, marking the progress of the times.

10 Red Men Participate.

To The Press of New Bern:

The celebration of the Bi-Centennial of the settlement of New Bern, the exercises of which began here yesterday was participated in by the Improved Order of Red Men who represented the Indian Tribes who occupied this territory prior to the settlement by the whites.

Delegations from all near by Tribes to the extent of about five hundred members were present in full Indian costume, presenting a most interesting, instructing and spectacular appearance.

It was particularly fitting that the Improved Order of Red Men, the oldest and largest fraternal organization of purely American origin and teachings should have taken such a prominent part in the exercises. The Improved Order of Red Men is practically a new organization in the South, the Great Council of North Carolina being but twelve years old, yet during this time it has experienced a phenomenal growth, now numbering eighty or more Tribes with a membership of over five thousand. This gain has been made without any special effort by the organization, which shows conclusively that the Order has merit. The organization as it now stands is the outgrowth of the Sons of Liberty a patriotic organization existing prior to the birth of the Republic, of which George Washington and other Revolutionary patriots were members.

The Sons of Liberty having served their purpose later formed themselves into the St. Tamina Societies for the purpose of remedying the political conditions which followed the formation of the Republic, they in turn became the Order of Red Men a semi-political fraternal body having its inception about 1818, and in 1832 they then at Baltimore, Md. formed themselves into the present organization known as the Improved Order of Red Men a purely fraternal organization which has had a continued uninterrupted existence to the present time. The Order is now firmly established in every State, Territory and Insular possession of the United States, numbering over one-half a million members. The latest statistics obtainable show the Order to have expended for relief of sick and disabled members, the immense sum of \$1,970,000.00; for burial of diseased members over \$270,000.00; for temporary relief of widows and orphans \$26,000.00; for care of orphans in private homes which is the Red Men's method of caring for orphans over \$28,000.00.

New Bern felt especially honored in the part taken by the Redmen in the Great Council of North Carolina, being represented through the presence here of its Great Sachem, William L. Stamey, of High Point who is the Editor of the Review of that City and of Tomahawk, the Official Organ of the Order in North Carolina. W. Ben Goodwin the efficient Great Chief of Records of Elizabeth City who has held that high position since practically the organization of the Great Council in this Reservation. Ben W. Taylor, Past Great Sachem of Washington who is one of the prominent members of the Order in that city.

Shortly after 3 o'clock this noted person and his adherents sailed majestically up Neuse river and landed at the foot of Pollock street where they were met by King Taylor and then marched up to the Indian Village which was located on the court house green.

After they had visited the Indian village the settlers then went to the academy green when a fierce fight ensued between them and the Indians and in which the settlers were defeated.

At 8:30 o'clock the colonists were secretly attacked and Baron DeGraffenried and John Lawson were captured and burned at the stake much to the delight of the Indians. After this the Indians went on a torch light parade over the business section of the city.

There are more than 2000 visitors now in the city and each train is bringing in more of them and by Wednesday there will be very little room left for them, but the reception committee have made arrangements to take care of all who come.
