BIG PARADE LAST NIGHT

Illuminated Pageant Most Spectacular and Inspiring Feature of the Day.

There may be many parades of various varieties in this city during the future years but there has never been or never will be another that will equal the spectacular illuminated parade which traversed the streets of this city last night and upon which at more than ten thousand people gazed with admiration.

At 8 o'clock the large number of floats which were used in the parade assembled on South Front street and were assigned to their respective places in the line and at 9 o'clock they started out upon their tour of the city. Thousands of spectators lined each side of the streets along the line and frequent applause as the floats were drawn majestically was heard. The majority of the floats and especially those illustrating the colonial period were brilliantly illuminated. The following floats participated in the parade: "The city of New Bern," representing the city of today; "The Indian Period," illustrating Indians before the coming of the whites; "Pioneer life among the colonists," six floats representing primeval life of the early settlers; "The colonial period," illustrating early settlers in North Carolina; "Parson Earl" Rev. Daniel Earl, an Englishman who first introduced fishing in North Carolina; "The Edenton Tea Party, Governor and Lady Tryon receiving at their palace, The first provincial congress in North Carolina. The Revolutionary Period, Governor Caswell taking the oath of office, Richard, Caswell Liberty, Reception of Geo. Washington at New Bern, German American float, from Wilmington, Educational Development, Gig crew of U. S. Revenue cutter "Pamlico" 1710 1910. There were also several other floats entered in the parade but it was impossible to get the names of the subjects at the hour of going to press.

After traversing several of the streets in the business section of the city the parade wended its way down Broad street in front of the grandstand where the judges were stationed. As the floats came abreast of the judges stand each of them was halted for a moment and carefully inspected.

After the parade had passed by the judges endeavored to decide to whom the prizes should be awarded but were unable to do so and the matter was continued until this morning.
