DROVE HOT POKER
INTO MAN'S BODY

Little Girl Tells Horrible Details of Murdering Her God-Father.

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 12.—The police are amazed at the stoical demeanor maintained by Catherine Botti, 12, who is now in jail here charged with the murder of Pasquale Volpe, 40, her grandfather, because of his alleged unwelcome attentions to her.

According to the post mortem examination the girl not only hit Volpe with an axe but the latter struck her several blows with a hatchet and then placed his lifeless body with a red hot poker.

When confronted with this new evidence this morning she did not change one particle, but said:

"Yes, I forgot to tell you about that. After I had hit him several times with an axe, I grew tired and picked up a hatchet and hit him two or three times, then I heated a poker and pushed it into his body. He had broken my heart and I wanted to break his."

Although unwilling to believe her confession, officers who worked on the case today acknowledged her story has verified in every detail, and have been unable to confirm their theories that other persons stronger than she had committed the crime.

HOOK WORM REVE-
LATIONS STARTLING

Disease Finds Large Field Among College Students and Soldiers. Lecture Monday Night at Court House

The facts being revealed by the hookworm investigation in M. C. are startling. Three years ago we were perturbed over the statement that the disease existed in our borders. When the examination of college students during the past winter showed that more than one-third of 600 students examined were found infected with hookworm disease, much surprise was expressed because the disease was only supposed to exist among the humble class of people. The surprise was still greater when the examination of about 1200 men constituting the soldiers of the State were examined at 38 per cent of those representing the western section of the State and 58 per cent of those representing the Eastern section of the State were found infected with the blood sucking parasite. If the class of men representing the soldiers, who are able to bear arms, and the students of colleges are thus so heavily infected, we may naturally expect to find the condition much worse among the less fortunate. This is emphasized by examination just completed of the orphans in the Old Fellows Orphanage at Goldsboro. Ninety-seven children were examined and fifty two were infected with hookworm disease, which is 53 per cent of the total number. Moreover, twenty of them were infected with other kinds of intestinal worms, five of these being infected with a kind of tapeworm. Does not conditions of this kind need attention of the Commonwealth?

The manner in which hookworm infection occurs is remarkable and very interesting. Experimentally, the infection has been produced by many of the Scientists by applying water or dirt contaminated with the infecting hookworm larvae which have hatched from eggs expelled from the bodies of infected people. When this contaminated water or soil is applied to the skin, only a day or two is required for a typical ground-itch to be set up. Following this ground-itch in five or six weeks the infecting larvae has passed through the body of the person and have taken up their domicile in the small intestine; there they suck blood, wound the flesh, and poison the system of the person. They are about half an inch long and about the size of a No. 8 thread. The remedy for the disease will kill these worms and they are then expelled from the body in immense numbers so that they may be collected as a proof of the infection. A pamphlet giving full information about the worm, its harmful action on the body, and the method of treating the disease will be furnished anyone on request to the State Board of Health at Raleigh, N. C. Tomorrow night at 8:30 o'clock at Grifin Memorial hall Dr. C. F. Strommer, representing the State Board of Health, Raleigh, N. C. will make an address of about 30 minutes on the Hook Worm. It will be worth hearing and there should be a large attendance.

POLICE WILL TEST
WHITE SLAVE LAW

Man Living in District of Columbia May Get Forty Years.

Washington, D. C., August 12.—The new Federal law prohibiting the "white slave" traffic, which was enacted following the recommendations of President Taft, will have its first exhaustive test in a case in which will be detailed events transpiring within half a mile of the Capitol.

Walter J. Bussius is in the District of Columbia jail today facing a charge which, under the new law, in case of his conviction, may result in a sentence of forty years and fines aggregating \$15,000.

The police, who have a complete narrative of the career of Mrs. Katherine Berkeley, twenty-three years old, from whom Bussius is alleged to have extorted money, are of the opinion that conditions probably more appalling than those exposed in New York or other large cities will be brought to light when the investigation is completed.

While waiting trial on charges of vagrancy, the woman was approached by Bussius in the court-room with a demand for money. Officers who observed the incident reported it to Judge Pugh, who consulted with United States District Attorney Turner. A warrant for the arrest of Bussius was ordered and in the meantime the woman was permitted to tell her story. The policemen were shocked at the sordid narrative.
