MAKE NO ATTEMPT TO HIDE

Identify Oyster Tongs Think They Are in the Right Police Fleet Ordered to the Scene

Newport News, Aug. 15.—Steaming at full speed, the oyster police flagship Commodore Maury, is now on her way from Irvington, Rappahannock river, to Day's Point, the scene of the oyster bludgeoning of yesterday. The Maury is expected to arrive in Hampton Roads early tomorrow morning, and she will be joined by the Vesta and James River, of the oyster fleet, before proceeding up the James.

Commissioners of Fisheries Leg dispatched the flagship from Irvington, but was not able to make the trip himself. No additional news has been received from the seat of trouble. It is said that the fifty or more tongs, who pulled private stakes from Days Point to Mulberry Point Thursday, confident of having acted within their rights, and making no effort to conceal their identity. They have about cleared the river of stakes placed on what they claim to be natural oyster rocks, and no further trouble is expected immediately.

If the planters should attempt to restore the stakes, without the support of police boats, however, there is no saying what might happen. Inspector Lawson said to-night that he would go to Days Point with the police fleet, and procure warrants against all of the stake pullers, who can be identified. The cases will be tried before an Isle of Wight magistrate.

The inspector declares that the stakes torn up were lawfully placed, according to lines furnished by the county surveyor. The planters having leased the grounds from the State. Even though the surveyor made the mistake of including portions of the natural rock in the grounds to be leased, the inspector says, the State would have to protect the interests of the planters against the belligerent tongs. The oyster season will not begin until Sept. 15th. During the closed season, the tongs are not allowed to touch the natural rocks, and they resent what they term encroaching upon the rocks by the private planters.

London, Aug. 15.—Florence Nightingale, the famous nurse of the Crimean War, and the only woman who ever received the Order of Merit, died yesterday afternoon at her London home. Although she had been an invalid for a long time, her death was somewhat unexpected. She sank gradually until 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon, when an attack of heart failure brought the end. Her funeral will be at 10 o'clock on Monday, in accordance with her wishes. On May 12, last, she celebrated her ninetieth birthday, and was the recipient of a congratulatory message from King George.

Coast Artillery Returns

The Coast Artillery returned last night from Fort Caswell, N. C. where they have been encamped during the past few days.

During their stay there the boys broke all records in proficiency with the 3-inch projecting guns which fire a projectile weighing 215 pounds.

In firing at a fixed target 3 miles distant the target was blown from the water with the first shot. After this feat had been performed the U. S. S. "Madeline," ranging at 6 miles an hour took in tow another target. Three shots were fired at this target, at a distance of 6 miles. The first passed over it about 10 feet, the second tore away part of the net which held the bull's eye and the third struck the iron post which supported the target.

RUN MOTOR CARS WITHOUT TROLLEY

Southern Makes Experiment in Thickly Settled Milling Section of South Carolina

Greenville, S. C., Aug. 15.—Electric motor car service without the use of trolley wires or the third rail, attachment is being given on the line of the Southern Railway and the Blue Ridge Railway between Greenville and Anderson, the intermediate territory being perhaps the most thickly settled milling section in the South, including the important points, Piedmont, Pelzer, Williamston and Belton.

The car is run by electricity generated by a gasoline engine. The powerful machinery is compactly placed in the forward end. It is easily manipulated, and the car is handled with perfect ease. The greatest interest is felt throughout this section in the motor car, and it is crowded every trip. The first day it was greeted by great crowds at every station. As one place a citizen was so anxious to get a view that he left the barber's chair, running to the station with his face covered with lather.

The new service is in addition to the steam trains run between Greenville and Anderson, and is expected to prove a great convenience. The operation of these cars, the first of their kind in the South, will be watched with great interest.

Wilmington, Aug. 15.—Colonel William L. DeRosset, aged 78 years, a Confederate veteran and one of Wilmington's most prominent citizens died Sunday morning after an illness of several months. He had been actively connected with the business life of this city for more than forty years, and only gave up his active duties a few years ago. He is the last of the older generation of the distinguished DeRosset family residing in this city. Colonel DeRosset is survived by one brother, Rev. Frederick DeRosset, an Episcopal minister of Curio, Ill., and one sister, Mrs. Gaston Meares, of this city. His wife, who before her marriage was Miss Elizabeth Nash, of Hillsboro, survives him, and four children, one by his first wife, William L. DeRosset, Jr., and three by his second, Mrs. Walter Holt of Fayetteville, A. Nash DeRosset of New York, and Miss Anita DeRosset, of this city. The remains were laid to rest Monday in Oakdale cemetery under the auspices of Cape Fear camp of Confederate veterans.

FRANK STAMPS CALLED IN

No More Free Telegraph Messages Can Be Sent After Tomorrow

Washington, D. C., Aug. 15.—Robert C. Chewry, president of the Western Union Telegraph Company and Clarence D. Mackay, president of the Postal Telegraph Company, are out in a circular letter to all holders of telegraph franks which entitled them in the past to send free telegraph messages of a social or personal character, advising them that on and after August 17th such franks cannot be accepted legally by their companies.

For many years it has been the custom of these telegraph companies to issue books containing stamps, somewhat similar in appearance to a postage stamp, each of these stamps entitling the holder to send a telegram containing not more than twenty words. The recall of these telegraph franks has been made imperative upon all telegraph companies by the passage of the bill amending the Hepburn Act signed by President Taft, June 18, and effective sixty days thereafter. These telegraph franks have been issued by the telegraph companies in former years practically to three classes of men, the politicians, that is to say the members of the National Congress, and grading down through the lesser lights to State Legislators; then of course the newspaper men of the country have been quite generally favored with this form of courtesy, ranging from the proprietor of a newspaper down along the line of newspaperdom. The third class, who in the past have enjoyed this franking privilege, were business men whose concerns did a great work over the lines. Now, however, all this is prohibited by law and every one must pay toll who desire to send a wire, the only exemptions made being officers, agents and employees of the telegraph companies. The railroad officials, it is understood, will enjoy the same courtesy as heretofore.
