JUMPS INTO CANAL TO AVOID

Train, Small Boy Borne Beneath Trestle by Swift Current and is Drowned.

Richmond, Aug. 18.—Lewis Rucker, the 12 year old son of Mrs. Henry Rucker, of 508 Beverly street, was drowned in the canal between Spruce and Seventh streets Tuesday afternoon about 6 o'clock.

Frightened by a passing shifting engine, the little boy stepped off the railroad tracks beneath the trestle at Sixth street, only to fall into the canal, where boys swim every day. He struggled in the water for a few seconds and then went down, his body being recovered before it reached the street car crossing of the canal at Seventh street. That his life was not saved is a mystery to all who witnessed the drowning.

A little deformed boy was sitting on the bank of the canal near where Little Lewis fell in, and reached his foot far out in an effort to save the drowning boy. Several grown men were standing near, but all evidently thought the boy would easily swim to the shore or strike against the gate at Seventh St. and be pulled up to shore. When he sank for the first time the people who had seen him in the water could scarcely believe he was drowned.

John Chatham, of 626 Church street, dived for the body and brought it to the surface. One of the first persons to get to the little fellow was Miss Ayer Smith, of 811 Church street. She did what she could to resuscitate the little fellow, but her efforts were in vain, death resulting in a few minutes.

A crowd of several hundred congregated near the canal within 15 minutes and none thought the child should have been allowed to drown. The canal is 8 feet deep at this point and is not more than 30 feet across. Most any man could have pulled the little fellow out.

When life was extinct the coroner was called, and after viewing the body and deeming an inquest unnecessary, he allowed it to be taken to the Methodist burial establishment.

The funeral services will be conducted from the grave Wednesday afternoon. The aged grandfather of the boy saw the body shortly after it was taken from the water. It was he who broke the sad news to the mother and father of the youth.

Little Lewis was to have been sent to the country Wednesday for his vacation. He had planned many amusements for his relatives and friends in the country and had looked forward with considerable expectation to the time when he should leave the city.

With a little friend, he left his home Tuesday afternoon, and when it rained he took shelter under the trestle near Sixth street. The passing of the shifting engine is thought to have caused him to lose his balance and fall into the canal, or either he was frightened and jumped from the tracks at the railroad into the water.

YOUNG HUSBAND SHOOTS HIMSELF

Enraged Because He Could Not See His Wife, From Whom He Was Separated.

Norfolk, Va., Aug. 18.—Lying upon a cot in the Norfolk county jail with a pistol shot wound entirely through his body and suffering excruciating pain is the condition of Charles Akers, a young man of Huntersville. His condition is regarded as serious by Dr. Ernest, physician to the jail, who states that an operation is necessary as soon as possible. The shot entered the lower part of the abdomen, passing out about an inch left of the spine.

Akers tells a most pathetic story of why he attempted to take his life. It was the result of a disagreement with his wife, to whom he had been married for just five months.

"I don't know why I did it. I was enraged at the time and whether it was an accident or whether I did it deliberately I cannot say," said Akers today. "All I know is that I went to my wife's father's home, where she was, and they would not let me in, and the next thing I knew, I was shot, I did it myself and no one else was present at the time."

Akers was brought to the county prison this morning shortly after 5 o'clock by Police Officer Cowan, of Tanner's Creek district. The wounded man is a clerk in the grocery of C. A. Merrill, at 506 Princess Anne avenue, Norfolk. He is 27 years of age and a native of Dynchburg. He came to Norfolk seven months ago and soon after his arrival here met a Miss Hayes, daughter of William Hayes, of 28 Percy street, Huntersville. They were married five months ago and everything went smoothly until a month ago, declares Akers. A disagreement then took place between them and they separated.

At an early hour this morning the wounded man says he called at his father-in-law's home and asked to be permitted to see his wife. He was denied admittance and within a short while the Hayes family heard the report of a pistol on the premises. Suspecting that Akers had shot himself, Mr. Hayes went to investigate. The young man was found lying on the floor of an out-house on the premises in a pool of his own blood.

TAKEN UP ON SUSPICION

In the meantime some bystander remembered reading an advertisement in one of the morning papers which corresponded with the message received by Chief of Police Hargett, and upon examination it was found that the animal corresponded with the description but that the vehicle was not the same.

When the owners of the vehicle finally appeared they were taken into custody and carried to police headquarters.

There the couple gave their names as Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Creider, of Aurora and that they had driven through the country from that place last Wednesday and were visiting a Mrs. Toler who resided in Bridgeton and who is relative of Mrs. Bridger.

The chief of police then made an attempt to get into communication with the authorities of Washington, but owing to the fact that the telephone connections with that town could not be made and as there was no definite evidence that the man had stole the animal he was discharged.

The affair created considerable excitement and there were at least two hundred people congregated in and around the city hall during time the couple were awaiting the disposition of the couple of police.
