PAYMASTER SHOT BY MASKED MEN

Bandits Fatally Wound Official and Kill His Driver.

New York, September 5.—Four masked men, leaping from their ambush in the thick woods between Newburgh and Hudson shortly after noon today, opened fire on Paymaster Dent Fowler, of the Atlas Brick Company and his negro driver, who were on their way from a bank to their homes with money to pay the company's employees.

George Rapone, the driver, was shot through the head and died instantly. Fowler was shot in the stomach, and died a few hours later in a hospital. The bandits got away with \$500 in cash.

The cowardly nature of the deed has stirred the authorities and citizens of the surrounding country as nothing has done in years. The entire district is being searched for the assassins. The fact that they wore black masks over the upper portions of their faces, and that Fowler was unconscious for most of the time he lived after the shooting, made it impossible for the police to obtain a description of the robbers. But they were obviously familiar with the paymaster's duties, and they had carefully selected the most remote spot for their ambush.

Fowler was the son of President Fowler of the Haverstraw Bank. He was known to be a man of great courage, and the bandits' haste to kill him without giving him a chance to surrender is supposed to have been due to fear that he was armed and would fight to the last in the execution of his duties.

The paymaster and his driver had gone to Newburgh in the morning to get the money with which to pay off the brick company's men, and were returning in the middle of the day, when a robbery on the frequented road seemed almost out of the question.

Fatally Injured.

Spencer, Sept. 5.—Luther French, an employee of a bridge force, rebuilding a bridge across the Yadkin river, near Spencer, was badly injured on the works today by being caught under a heavy iron beam being raised to the span of the bridge. One arm was broken and he was otherwise bruised, but will soon recover.

Farmers Raising More Wheat

It is estimated by the State Department of Agriculture that as compared with 1909 there is a gain this year of 20 per cent in the wheat crop. The estimate is that there has been an average yield of 19 bushels to the acre against 15.5 bushels last year. On this showing there was a \$20,000,000 increase in the State this year. The acreage last season was 2,200,000; this year 2,600,000. It is stated that the crop is not only larger, but that the quality is better than for many years.

HAS HIS SKULL CRUSHED

Mr. E. C. Gaskins Attempts to Board Moving Train and is Thrown Violently to the Ground.

While attempting to board the west bound passenger train at Morehead City yesterday afternoon Mr. E. C. Gaskins of the city and who is employed by the Norfolk-Southern Railway Company as a machinist in their shops, was thrown from the train, his head striking a protruding beam, and he now lies at Stewart's Sanatorium with a crushed skull and in a critical condition.

The force of machinists at the Norfolk-Southern shops had a holiday yesterday and Mr. Gaskins decided to spend the day at Morehead City, en route to the fishing. Just before the train was due to arrive at that place last evening he started for the depot. For some reason he stopped on the way to that place and by the time he got there the train was pulling out. He at once began to run in order to board it before it had gained so much momentum. He succeeded in getting near enough to the train to place his hands on the railing which was as a guard to the steps, his foot slipped and he fell heavily to the ground. In doing this his head struck the corner of a cross-tie and the momentum of his body, added to its weight, was so great that a gaping hole was knocked in his skull.

Passengers on the train saw the accident and they signalled to the engineer to stop. This was done and the young man was carried into one of the coaches and temporary medical assistance was rendered him. Upon reaching this city he was immediately carried to Stewart's Sanatorium where an operation was performed and at a late hour last night he was resting as well as could be expected but his condition is very critical.

Mr. Gaskins married a Miss Thomas, of Swift Creek, about two years ago and since that time have resided on East Front street.

Mrs. Tisdale Dead.

Elizabeth, the wife of George F. Tisdale died at the home of her sister, Mrs. Sarah Filippine, near Vanceboro where she had been visiting.

Mrs. Tisdale was 62 years of age and was a member of the Christian church in this city.

The remains were laid to rest in the family burying ground of Mr. Freeman Gaskins, near where the death occurred.

STRIKERS JOYFUL OVER SETTLEMENT

Happiness Reigns on all Sides When Cloak Makers Resume Work.

New York, Sept. 5.—Scenes of rejoicing unquies in the history of the East Side were witnessed today as the 250,000 cloakmakers, who have been on strike for nine weeks, prepared to return to work after having scored one of the most notable victories achieved by organized labor.

Yesterday all were in the depths of despondency, facing hunger and eviction, but desperately determined to resist to the end for the right to labor under sanitary conditions, average hours a living wage and recognition of their union.

Today in most of the factories, decorated for sixty-three days, there was again the whirr of machinery and the laughter and chatter of happy workers. And in the crowded tenements the aged and infirm dependents and the very young children, who are unable to work, were as cheerful as their parents, brothers and sisters, who had gone back to work.

The end of the strike came suddenly following a conference, at which the operators conceded nearly all of the union demands. On the question of recognition of the union, the rock upon which settlement preparations have been wrecked in the past, a compromise satisfactory to the union was reached.

The employers agreed that in hiring help preference should be given to union members. A nine-hour work day, with a Saturday half holiday; a wage rate ranging from \$10 to \$25 a week, with even higher wages for "piece workers; free power to operate machines; a sanitary board and an arbitration commission are among the concessions made to the union workers.
