KILLS HUSBAND IN JEALOUS FIT

Abused Wife's Control Fled When She Saw Spouse Driving With Another Woman. Cape Charles, Va., Sept. 13th.—Jealous and absorbed with the one desire of revenge for past treatment, Mrs. Annie Elizabeth Hudson, the deserted wife of Toby Hudson, of Laurel, shot and killed him Friday morning at Salisbury, Md.

The shooting took place in State's Attorney J. L. Bell's office. On Wednesday at Mrs. Hudson went to Salisbury and preferred charges of desertion against her husband. The trial took place before Justice Trader, and Hudson was held under \$250 bail for court.

They got together in his office Thursday, and after talking the matter over Hudson agreed to return to Cambridge, Md., and support his wife. Mrs. Hudson immediately withdrew her charges against her husband, and the bail money which he had paid in cash was returned. It seems that they were to go to Cambridge Friday, but later the wife heard that Hudson was seen Thursday night out driving with another woman. She appeared at the State's Attorney's office Friday morning and asked Bailey to have her husband come to his office, as she wished to have a talk with him before leaving. The meeting was arranged. Hudson was finally located, and on request of Bailey went to his office immediately where they went into a rear room where they were seemingly talking matters over very quietly.

But when called in another office. No sooner than out of their sight, Mrs. Hudson drew a revolver and fired at her husband, striking him in the temple, causing him to fall against a safe and cutting his other temple, breaking his eyes glasses, causing a deep cut over the right eye. On hearing the pistol shot, Bailey rushed into the room where he had left them only a few minutes previous, and found Hudson lying in blood, with his wife standing over him with a smoking pistol in her hand. Hudson was rushed to the Peninsula Hospital, where he died Friday evening. Mrs. Hudson was immediately placed under arrest and sent to jail.

BAILEY BOUND OVER TO COURT

William J. Bailey, the young white man, who seriously injured John Havens colored, by cutting his throat with a pocket knife while he was attempting to pass Bailey and Whit e J. Burlew's were engaged in an affray in M. Goldman's store on Middle street in Thursday night and who also cut Hurt several times was given a preliminary hearing before Justice of the Peace W. K. Baxter at the court house yesterday afternoon and probable cause being found he was bound over to the next term of Craven County Superior Court under a bond of \$1,000 in default of which he was committed to jail.

Only one of these, the murder of Clayton Kennedy has, however, proved fatal up to the present time. The following is the list of those injured, and the cause:

On August 24 Mr. Cox, night clerk at the Gaston Hotel suffered a fracture of skull by being struck with an ice pick in the hands of a negro bell boy.

Geo. Gales, colored, leg broken by rolling log at Roper's Mill on August 26th.

August 28th, James Hays, colored, thrown from wagon painfully injured.

September 5th, Mr. E. C. Gaskins fell from train at Morehead City has skull fractured.

September 8th, John Havens, colored throat cut while acting as peace-maker in street fight.

September 9th, Whitford Hurt, stabbed several times in street fight.

September 9th, Mr. Geo. Driggers, suffered fractured skull by being struck by protruding water pipe.

September 11 Clayton Kennedy colored killed by being struck on the head with a hot gun.

September 10th, David Spencer, white fell from bicycle, skull fractured.

There were quite a number of minor cutting scrapes in which several of the participants were pretty badly served up but none of these showed a tendency to have any serious results and are eliminated. Not before in years has the hospital been so crowded.

AUTOPSY REVEALS FRACTURED SKULL

Coroner Holds an Inquest Over The Body of Clayton Kennedy.

As an aftermath to the murder of Clayton Kennedy which occurred on Craven street early Sunday morning, Ref. Bryant, alias Milledge, colored, a now confined in Craven county jail charged with the murder, and Kath Gardner and Kennedy's wife are being held as witnesses.

At 11 o'clock Sunday morning the Coroner summoned a jury and met at the city hall where the witnesses and alleged murderer were examined. The stories told by them were so conflicting that the jury decided that an inquest would have to be performed before anything definite could be ascertained. This could not be done just at that time and the inquest was postponed until yesterday.

Yesterday morning an inquest was held and it was found that Kennedy's skull had been fractured in four places on the right side of his head, and that this would have necessitated several blows, (this corroborates the Gardner woman's testimony, she saying that Bryant struck several times) with some heavy blunt instrument.

The preliminary hearing of the case was to have been held yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the city hall. At that hour at least three hundred people had assembled there, but the State was not ready for the examination and it was postponed until this afternoon at 2 o'clock.

As the case now stands things look pretty black for Rufus Bryant, the alleged murderer, but it is evident that he had one or more accomplices in the deed and the police are making every effort to collect as much material evidence as possible along this line before the preliminary examination is held.

About 11 o'clock last night Deputy Williams brought to this city and lodged in the county jail, Henry Keimer, colored, who was caught on board a rail boat off Broad Creek by Deputy Williams who followed this negro who was wanted by the Coroner's jury.

Assaults Young Boy

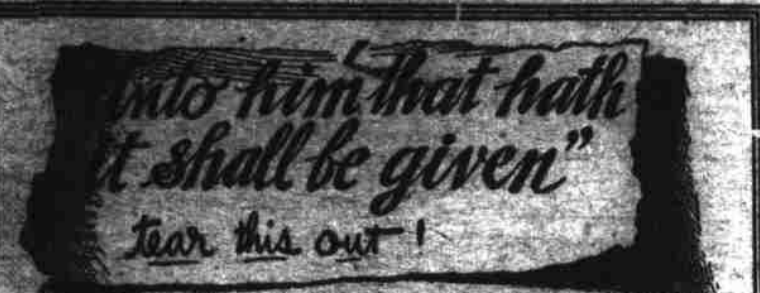

Roper's Mill was reached but instead of stopping the negro rode on until a patch of high grass and weeds was reached, here he dismounted and before the boy could escape threw him to the ground and beat him badly.

The negro claimed that he was at loose all during the day and in order to secure more evidence the case was run through.
