CHASTLY MURDER IN CHESTER.

Hotel Proprietor Found in Room With His Throat Cut, His Son in Under Arrest.

Chester, Pa., Sept. 17.—John J. Evans, proprietor of the Edgemont Hotel, this city, was murdered tonight while asleep in his room. His son, Richard, aged 19 years, was arrested charged with the crime and is now in the county jail at Media.

Early in the evening Evans went to his room to lie down. As he did not return to the office at his usual hour, Wm. Niskerson, a magistrate in the second ward, went to the room occupied by Evans to awaken him. When he opened the door he was horrified to see the pillow covered with blood and a gasping wound behind Evans' left ear. The police officials were at once notified and a physician was quickly summoned, but the latter reported that Evans had been dead for at least an hour.

Suspects pointed to the son who had been about the hotel early in the evening, but who had not been seen around the hostelry for nearly two hours. Search was at once made for the boy and he was found late tonight at Elwyn, a small town about three miles from this city.

The police officials state that it is their belief that the murder was committed while the lad was temporarily insane.

Has Turned Out \$50,000,000 in Gold
Washington, D. C., Sept. 17.—The Klondike placer mining district in Alaska has produced \$150,000,000 in gold since 1898 and mining experts estimate the amount yet to be mined will equal that already produced. Consul Cole, of Dawson, states that the gold output for 1910 will exceed that of 1909 when more than three and a half millions were produced. Most of this gold is states was shipped to the United States. A small quantity went to the new Canadian mint. Consul Cole, at Dawson, reports that rich deep sites of copper ore have been discovered in the southern part of the Klondike district.

HUGE PAY ROLL FOR OUR ARMY
Government Pays \$45,632,959 to Soldiers for One Year—Also Incidentals.
Washington, D. C., Sept. 17.—The pay of the army for the fiscal year ended June, 1910, was \$45,632,959, according to the report of Paymaster-General Charles H. Whittle in the absence of war, made public today.

This does not include payment for incidental expenses, such as mileage to officers, and expenses of equipment, manure, for the West Point or the Army War College. Pay on account of the military academy amounted to \$244,500 for the year.

Thirty on the part of the soldiers is indicated in a steady increase in the deposits with the paymaster during the last few years. During the last year \$2,122 such deposits were made amounting to \$1,079,000, a marked improvement over the deposits of the preceding year.

Editor Julian Passes Away
Salisbury, N. C., Sept. 17.—John M. Julian, editor of the Salisbury Evening Post, whose illness with pneumonia has attracted wide attention, died yesterday.

Mr. Julian, who was stricken two weeks ago, had been unconscious since Sunday and despite skillful attention he grew gradually worse. He was a member of the North Carolina Legislature and was Secretary and Treasurer of the Bill Nye Memorial Association in this State. He was 36 years old and is survived by a wife and three children.

At the beginning of Lee S. Overman's term in the United States Senate Mr. Julian served as his private secretary in Washington. He was a son of the late Senator D. B. Julian, of Rowan county. For the past six years he was editor of the Salisbury Post and took a leading part in the North Carolina Press Association. He was a representative of the Associated Press.

It is with sincere regret that the Journal learns of Editor Julian's demise. He was a life that was spent in assisting the needy. A newspaper man from his youth. A man of sterling qualities and a man whose good deeds will be a monument to his memory in future years.

A Flood of Mullet
Beaufort, N. C., Sept. 17.—Fishermen who have returned from their vacations after good luck and poor, will find in their office chairs when they hear this story of the opening of the fishing season in this port. Next in order will be tales of incoming vessels going high and dry on shoals of mullet. Everybody is full of mullet and the fish are coming in so fast that the price has dropped from three cents a pound to two. Some fishermen have refused the low rate and are running their schooners into the inland ports in search of a better. One captain ran ten miles to escape the two-cent rate and got 3-1-2.

If the 800,000 pounds of mullet landed here during the last three score hours extended head to tail in a straight line, and moved in that direction, they would reach from here to Greensboro. The sounds and boys as well as the ocean in the vicinity are alive with mullets and about six hundred people are enjoying the catch.

ROOSEVELT MAY JOIN WITH HEARST

Editor Politician's Lieutenant, Col. Graves Talks With Ex-President Over "Boss" Fight.

New York, Sept. 17.—That there is more than a possibility that there will be an alliance between Colonel Theodore Roosevelt and William Randolph Hearst in connection with the Roosevelt fight against the "boss" and the interests in politics, was indicated today. John Temple Graves, chief political lieutenant of Hearst, called to see Roosevelt at the Outlook office this afternoon. He came at the latter's request, but beyond admitting the fact that Colonel Roosevelt refused to discuss the visit, he refused to explain if he sent for Graves to accept the Hearst offer of the support of his independent party.

Graves and the colonel were closeted in the latter's private office for some time. When the candidate of the independent party for vice-president in the last national campaign departed he was smiling broadly. He was far from being laqueous, however.

"All I care to say is that all of the politics we discussed it, what one could expect would be talked when one meets Colonel Roosevelt. There was no particular political subject under discussion, neither was there any conspiracy."

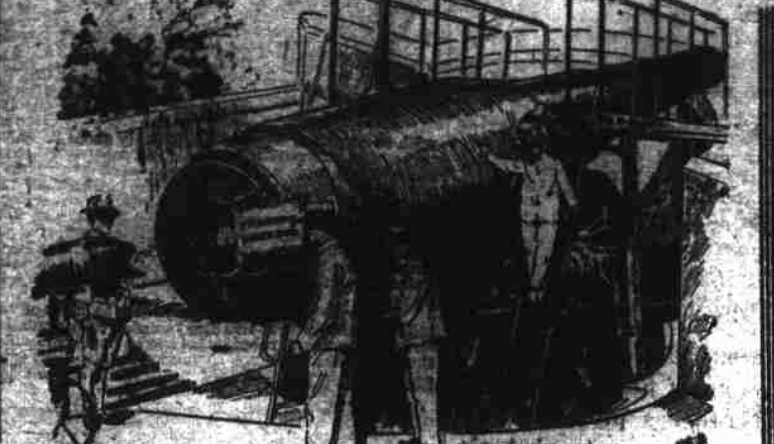
