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SHORT PASSING EVENTS.

Five bales of cotton were sold on the local market yesterday. The price paid was 25 cents.

The local market was well supplied yesterday with shell oysters that were brought in by local oyster dredgers. The quality of these oysters however still remains poor.

Another large shipment of fish passed through this city yesterday morning enroute from Morehead City to towns in the western section of the state. The shipments all during the past week were exceedingly large.

The young people of the different Sunday schools of the city are cordially invited to meet at the Sunday school room of Centenary M. E. Church this afternoon at 4 o'clock to practice songs for the W. C. T. U. State convention.

Each day sees New Bern's new Union passenger depot that much nearer to completion. The weather during the past few days has been excellent for the carpenters and masons to push their work forward and they are making rapid progress.

The "White Ribbon," or state convention of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, will meet in New Bern this year, beginning October 1st. Elaborate preparations are being made by the New Bern league for the entertainment of the visitors.

Practically every day now sees a new case added to the criminal docket of the next term of Craven County Superior Court. Already there are more defendants in jail than can be tried at the one week term and they continue to come. A special term will have to be called.

Quite a large number of people, both white and colored attended the corner stone laying at St. Cyprian's Church yesterday afternoon. Included in the program were several addresses by prominent white citizens and these were greatly enjoyed by the entire audience.

New Bern's amateur photographers are doing much to push the city to the front by advertising it in some of the latest periodicals in the country. Recently several photographs of various events and places have appeared in these publications and they have attracted much attention.

This promiscuous ringing of the fire alarms is becoming to be a decided nuisance and is a dangerous thing, as a number of accidents to the horses and members of the company during the past few months have proven and if the person who causes the alarm to be turned in is captured he should not be given the least consideration.

Mr. H. C. V. Peebles has a dog that has adopted a young brood of chickens. At first, when the dog manifested such interest in the biddies, Mr. Peebles feared that he meant to harm them, but the canine exhibited a fondness that soon won the little chicks and they clambered all over him and nestled to him as though the dog was their mother.—Kinston Free Press.

Shortly before 6 o'clock yesterday afternoon a horse which was hitched to a dray and which was standing near the Cotton Exchange on Craven street became frightened at some trivial object and dashed off down the street toward the river. Losing his foothold on the pavement he fell and slid clear across the street. In doing this he was badly bruised. No other damage was done.

The writer was informed yesterday that there were now seventy-one prisoners now confined in Craven county jail. Of this number forty are awaiting trial at the next term of superior court and thirty-one are road prisoners and there only at night. Such a number of people confined in such a small place cannot but fail to produce unsanitary conditions which of course breed various disease germs and something should be done to avoid this if possible.

While engaged in conversation with another gentleman yesterday morning and in the meantime smoking his pipe, Mr. J. C. Rigdon, who is connected with the Cutler-Blades Hardware Co., was blinded by a flash of fire from the bowl of his pipe. Upon investigation it was found that a 22 calibre cartridge, of which Mr. Rigdon had several in his pocket at the time, had in some way become mixed up with the smoking tobacco and been placed in the pipe. The bowl of the pipe was entirely demolished, but fortunately Mr. Rigdon was not injured.

MET DEATH AT HUSBAND'S HAND

Two Armenians Run Across Ne-mesis in the United States. Lowell, Mass., Sept. 26.—Fleeing to this country to escape trial for a murder charge in far off Armenia, Mohamad Ahmad and Ahmad Moory today unexpectedly found their nemesis in the husband of the woman whom they were accused of murdering. As a result of this meeting Ahmad lies dead from a bullet from a revolver in the hands of the avenging husband. Moory is in the hospital fatally injured from another bullet at the hands of the same man.

Bogos Matsukian, the husband, who did the shooting is in jail. He calmly said, as he lighted a cigarette, "They killed her, I killed them; it is well, I am glad."

During the recent massacres in Armenia Matsukian said the two men had attacked and maltreated his wife, afterwards killing her. They then fled to Lowell, not knowing that the husband was there.
