BIRD MAN FLIES 9,121 FEET HIGH

Wymalen, New Bird Man Breaks World's Record For Altitude.

Mourmelon, France, Oct. 1.—M. Wymalen, the aviator, established a new world's record for altitude, rising to a height of 9,121 feet.

The earlier best mark of 8,400 feet was made by the late George Chaves. Wymalen rose until his motor failed him and then made a perilous descent. He suffered intensely as his exciting experience was similar to that of Leon Morane, who, on September 8 ascended 8,271 feet, establishing a record that stood until eclipsed by Chaves.

Wymalen started and warmed up by circling the aerodrome several times, testing his engine. When everything was working shipshape he gradually rose in a spiral course. At an altitude of 2,500 metres he encountered biting cold. His ears and fingers were numbed and an icy gale that slashed his face checked and at times drove back the machine. Nevertheless, the aviator continued the struggle upward.

At a height of 2,780 metres (9,121 feet) the motor stopped and Wymalen found that his fuel was exhausted. There was nothing left for him to do but to plane down to the earth. This was accomplished in thirteen minutes, but the graduated descent required a battle with the wind which threatened to dash the biplane to the ground. The airman landed safely, but was thoroughly exhausted.

An examination showed that the carburetor had been frozen at the high altitude, thus crippling the power of the machine. The flight was official and the record will stand.

Miss Phelps Makes Interesting Lecture.

One of the largest audiences ever assembled in any church in this city greeted Miss Lillian Phelps, of St. Catherine's, Ont., last Sunday evening at Centenary Methodist church, and for two hours listened spell-bound to this gifted orator. Miss Phelps gave a rapid review of the temperance conditions, showing conclusively the growth of public sentiment. She advocated a total prohibition, of the manufacture and sale of intoxicants, and said a generation of such measure would prove, beyond a question, the wisdom of its adoption. She said that in this day and age, anything can be marketed and sold by advertising and if this were ceased a generation would demonstrate the wisdom of such a measure.

It was a pleasure to listen to the lecturer. Beautiful in language, and yet the discourse was so freight with scenes of human degradation and was that the heart of the listener often ached with sympathy for the poor victim of the world wide curse of alcohol.

New Bern pulpits and rostrums have resounded with the oratory of celebrities, but we have rarely, if ever listened with keener relish than we did to this lecture.

Jewish New Year.

Today is the Jewish New Year, 5,671, and all of the Jew business houses will be closed and the day will be a holiday.

There are quite an abundance of festivals and holidays in the Jewish calendar, but none touches the hearts of the children of Israel to such depths as does Rosh Hashonah, as the New Year's Day is designated by the Israelites. To them it is the important day in the year—the day on which God sits in judgment. Rosh Hashonah does not, like most other Jewish holidays, commemorate any historical event, but is rather a time for repentance. The New Year begins a sacred period known as ten days of penitence. The last of these days, the day of atonement, is the most solemn of the entire year.

700 COTTON MILLS SHUT DOWN

200,000 Men Idle in Great Britain Because of Differences Between Employer and Employee.

Manchester, Eng. Oct. 3.—The Federation of Master Cotton Spinners declared a lockout of 130,000 operatives, and at noon closed the doors of the 700 mills owned by its members.

This tying up of the Lancashire industry is the upshot of a trivial dispute arising from the discharge of a single employe at the Fern mill in Oldham.

The total of men idle in England as a result of differences between employer and employe is now 200,000. Unless George Ranken Askwith, Comptroller-General of the Commercial, Labor and Statistical Department of the Board of Trade, is successful in his effort to arrange a settlement of the latest quarrel hundreds of other workmen will be without employment next week.

George Howe, an employe of the Fern mill, was dismissed because, upon orders from his labor union, he refused to carry out the instructions of his foreman to clean the machinery which operated.

Howe took the ground that the cleaning of machinery was not a part, property of his work. A strike followed, and arbitration was sought. The owners of the Fern mill insisted, however, that before the dispute was submitted to arbitration work be resumed without the employment of Howe. The operatives, on the other hand demanded that either the mill remain closed until the arbitrators had rendered a decision or Howe be permitted to resume work temporary with the other men.

At this point the federation took a hand and threatened a lockout unless the Fern mill men accepted arbitration on the terms proposed by the owners. The Card-room Amalgamation refused to yield, and after several conferences hope of an amicable adjustment was abandoned.
