MORGAN AS HONDURAS' BOSS

Report That He Will Lead That Country \$10,000,000.

New Orleans, Jan. 7.—That Gen. Manuel Bonilla, Honduran rebel leader, today holds the key to the key to the Central American republic as the result of his capture of Roston Island is confirmed in dispatches from Puerto Cortes. The prospect of immediate intervention of the reported deal by which J. P. Morgan & Co. assumes the indebtedness of the Honduran Government is apparently the most vital question being discussed in Central America and the foreign colony here. President Davila has commissioned government agents to negotiate finally with the Morgan syndicate the proposed bonding of the national debt.

It is stated in authoritative quarters in Wallstreet today that the proposed loan to Honduras, to be floated by J. Pierpont Morgan, will be only \$10,000,000, instead of \$40,000,000 as first reported. The negotiations for the loan have not been closed.

Farmers Buy Too Much.

In the supplementary bulletin just issued from the State department of agriculture and gotten up by State Agronomist J. L. Burgess, very valuable and significant estimates are made of food products shipped into North Carolina that ought to be grown by the farmers of the State. It shows that not less than 80,500 tons of mill feed valued at \$1,368,070 came into the State, \$4,227,686 worth of wheat and flour; \$5,877,148 worth of cured meat; \$1,123,166 worth of corn and oats; \$221,875 worth of hay; \$49,655 worth of butter. The conclusion reached in this special investigation, as expressed by Agronomist Burgess is that every farmer should make it a point to at least raise his own home supplies, no matter what special crop his lands and section may be especially adapted.

Raleigh, Jan. 7.—If the recommendations of Secretary Fogue, of the North Carolina State Fair are carried out by the executive committee the management of the 1911 fair will be instructed to rigidly cut out all shows in which dancing girls appear and games in which any phase of gambling appears. Mr. Fogue declared in his report to the executive committee that there are plenty of decent and interesting shows and innocent games of skill with fixed returns to be had after cutting out all the bad and worthy ones that apply. The state fair is shown in the report to have been a record breaking success with 2,300 more entries than for the year previous. The premiums awarded aggregated \$4,025, against \$2,700 in 1909.

TAFT FAVORS PRISONS

Fines Not Sufficient For the Criminal Rich. Harlan Sentenced to 18 Months in Prison.

Washington, Jan. 7.—"Fines are not effective against men of wealth. Imprisonment is necessary," wrote President Taft in a decision in refusing to commute a prison sentence against W. S. Harlan, manager of one of the greatest lumber and turpentine interests in Florida and Alabama. Harlan was sentenced in the United States Circuit court to 18 months in prison and to pay a fine of \$5,000. The decision was affirmed by the Supreme Court of the United States. President Taft commuted the term to six months.

The conviction of Harlan grew out of efforts of his company to secure 180 immigrant laborers from New York.

TOBACCO TRUST WAR IS ON

\$4000,000,000 At Stake—Argument Before Supreme Court.

Washington, Jan. 7.—Before the Court of Last resort yesterday began the final supreme legal battle in which hangs the fate of the American Tobacco Company and its subsidiary corporations.

Some of the highest-priced lawyers in the country yesterday began their arguments before the Supreme Court of the United States for and against the Sherman Anti-trust law and that many tentacles octopus, the Tobacco Trust. On the cogency of their presentation of the evidence depends either the life or death of a vast combine of corporations constituting a business with over \$400,000,000 of invested capital—and on the one hand, a strengthening of the Sherman Anti-trust law; or, on the other hand, an annihilation of that statute which will nullify the Government's strongest weapon against corporate aggression.

The setting for this legal Waterloo was the small, prin chamber of the Court, and the audience of nine justices of the highest court, and a closely packed crowd of lawyers, business men and visitors. The generals in command of the opposing forces were Attorney General Wickersham and Special Attorney J. C. Reynolds, for the Government, and Attorneys John G. Johnson and William B. Harbrower, for the Tobacco Trust. To Johnson, as chief counsel for the appellant, fell the duty of making the opening argument, and his legal defense of the accused corporations consumed by far the greater part of the day.
