## NEW BILLS FLOWING IN

Important Sections Numbering 62 of Revenue Bill Passes House.

Raleigh, Feb. 23.—The House spent two and a half hours on the revenue bill and passed 62 sections, making some notable amendments. Considerable time was spent on section 45, taxing wholesale dealers in horses \$50 and an amendment adopted that no dealer should be required to take out both retail and wholesale licenses. Sec. 35, and 41 as to livery stable men were then left open for future consideration. Sec. 37 was amended so as to increase the tax on automobile dealers from \$25 to \$50, an amendment by Ewart to increase it to \$100 being voted down. Section 46 was amended so as to include all forty-one tellers and clairvoyants in the \$200 tax. All other sections to and including section 55 were adopted without further change except that bottling works taxes are adjusted as above stated.

Section 62 taxing druggists \$25 for selling liquor was adopted without change, although there was long discussion. Ewart wanted it increased to \$100, charged that one druggist in Charlotte ordered 50 barrels at one time. Speaker Dowd explained pleasantly that this was just before the Republican convention. Ewart came back that he was told 100 barrels were ordered for the Democratic State Convention there and that the city aldermen helped to pay for it. Section 48 was amended to tax Gypsies for selling both horses and mules instead of applying to only horses as at present. The committee of the whole arose and Chairman Ray reported the progress of the adoption of 62 sections of the revenue bill and the House voted concurrence.

New bills continue to pour into the House, nearly 1,500 thus far have been introduced.

## YOUNG MAN MURDERS WOMAN

Becomes Enraged at Woman of Ill Reputation and Fires Five Bullets Into Her Body.

Goldboro, Feb. 23.—Shortly before 9 o'clock this afternoon Roscoe Rivenbark, son of a prominent business man in this city, shot and instantly killed Blanche Jones, a woman of ill repute at her home in this city.

Yesterday morning Rivenbark visited the woman's home and spent several hours there. Leaving shortly after noon he was to lunch after which he returned. Only a few minutes had elapsed after he had entered the home before other inmates heard five reports of a revolver and immediately afterward Rivenbark rushed from the house. An investigation was made and it was found that the woman had been shot five times in the breast.

The police were notified of the shooting and less than half an hour later they had the murderer behind bars. He will be given a preliminary hearing tomorrow morning, in the meantime he is being held without bond.

## PANAMA FAIR GAGS CALIFORNIA

New Treaty With Mikado Explains President's Apparent Opposition to New Orleans

Washington, Feb. 23.—One explanation of President Taft's eager support of San Francisco as the site for the exposition celebrating the opening of the Panama Canal was found in the elimination of the immigration restriction clause and other concessions made to the Japanese in the new proposed treaty with Japan which the Senate Committee on Foreign Affairs today decided to recommend for ratification.

Taft believes he and Congress have cut San Francisco and California under bond to keep the peace until after 1915, the year of the exposition. That the new Japanese element in California would raise great objection to any concession in Japan was considered, but the bill still the exposition home area.

"If California intends to hold a great international exposition in 1915, then, says that all other States, she must endeavor to keep all of our international relations as friendly as possible," declared a prominent diplomat today. "It is important that California should be willing to make a treaty with Japan."

The treaty will have the most important effect in the fact that the President will be able to keep the peace until after 1915, the year of the exposition. ## PUBLIC MEETING OF CITIZENS

They Are Asked to Consider an Amendment to the City Charter.

A public meeting was called at the court house last night to consider three proposed amendments to the city charter by the legislature. Mr. Jas. A. Bryan was made Chairman and Wm. Dunn, Jr. and A. E. Stevens, Secretaries.

Wm. Dunn, Jr. read the bill asked to be passed to amend the charter. The section first acted on by the meeting was regarding the salary of the city attorney, whether it should be left entirely to the board of aldermen, or a fixed sum named. It was voted that the present salary \$200 and extra be allowed to stand.

The consolidation of the fifth and sixth wards was voted for. Wm. Dunn, U. D. Bradham Mayor McCarthy and others spoke on this and the sense of the meeting was that there were too few voters in these wards for such large representation in the city council. It was a vote of the "parious" times of 1898 and conditions had changed said H. Lane. This will reduce the board to ten members and the wards will correspond in number to those at a Congressional election.

The third section acted on was in regard to the compensation of the city tax collector. At four per cent this now amounted to \$2,600 and under the assessment it would be \$3,000. On motion the fixed salary of \$1,000 was voted for and ordered entered in the proposed bill.

S. H. Lane moved that all officers be limited to two terms, for the good of the city and as Democratic doctrine, but this was not acted on.

Prof. H. B. Craven made a motion in regard to collection of city taxes, making a system of discounts and penalties. Considerable discussion ensued on this and the action finally taken was that Representative Nunn be requested to consider the matter upon the basis of a discount of 5 per cent for payment of taxes in September, 2 per cent in October, 1 per cent in November, and at January let an interest charge of 2 per cent per annum be made.

Wm. Dunn Jr. was made a committee of one to take care of the bill and have it reach Mr. Nunn at Raleigh.

### Important New Post Office Ruling

The postoffice department has issued an order affecting publishers which is of particular interest. It requires that when second class mail matter, including newspapers, periodicals, magazines, etc., are left in the office unclaimed for any cause, the postmaster shall send in the newspaper, magazine, etc., a notice of the non-delivery of the same, and that after five weeks from the sending of the notice, if the newspapers, etc., are unclaimed, the postmaster shall attach to them a label and return to the publisher and collect postage at the rate of one cent for each two ounces. If, however, the publisher sends stamps for the return of the matter, postage will be accepted at the rate of one cent for each four ounces. This order makes it of almost importance for the postmaster to keep the publishers informed of matters that are involved, on account of refusal to accept, and it also places in circulation upon subscribers to have at the postoffice in whose vicinity they live to immediately inform the postmaster of any change of address so he, as well as the subscriber, can notify the postmaster and save delay and expense.
