NO PAY FOR THE MILITIA

Bill to Place Officers on Pay Basis Defeated by Technicality.

Washington, March 2—After a fight in the House a direct vote on the bill to establish the organized militia upon a pay basis was prevented by a technicality.

The bill provides a system of federal pay for the officers and enlisted men of the State militia, based upon their efficiency and their attendance upon drills and regular duties.

The bill makes the members of the militia subject to direct call by the President for service as a regular national defense force, and binds the members to service for a period of two years from date of the president's summons.

The latter provisions were proposed by the war department and their character provoked much opposition from Democrats and a few Republican members who declared that the officials of the war department were trying to develop a spirit of militarism.

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PERSONAL LOCKER BILL PASSED

For Farm Life Schools, Wake County Bill Fiasco, Wins Down for Prolet.

Raleigh, March 2—The House spent from 8 to nearly 11 o'clock yesterday, debating out and amending and finally passing on all readings of the bill by Lehman to prohibit the sale of handling of intoxicating liquors by the club or association, an amendment being adopted that eliminates the clause that would prohibit members of clubs having liquor in their personal lockers.

The bill as it passed follows: Section 1. That any corporation, club, association or person who shall directly or indirectly keep or maintain by itself or himself or by association with others or who shall in any manner aid, assist or abet in keeping or maintaining a club room or place where intoxicating liquors are received or kept to be drunk or for barter or sale or distribution or for division or use among the members of any club or association by any means whatever shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, provided that nothing in this act shall be construed to prohibit hospitals, drug stores and dispensaries and asylums for keeping intoxicating liquors for medical purposes, and provided further, that nothing in this act shall be construed as repealing or modifying and local laws regulating these matters.

Section 2. This act shall be in force from and after July 1, 1911.

The House passed 95 to 15 the Senate bill for farm life schools after a spirited debate, that this was a Utopian scheme that could not work out in practice and that the State is not financially able to undertake this phase of paternalism at this time.

There were explanations as to the shelved loss of the Wake county bill for salaries for officers, Kellom, of New Hanover, insisting that the advancement of \$100 reward in the Raleigh morning paper was a reflection on the clerks and members.

Speaker Dowd explained that the whole thing was a misunderstanding and that the bill had merely been misplaced as between different papers for a short time and that it was at one time really lost.

Senator Baggett got in a resolution to substitute requiring pulling of passengers on trains. A number of other amendments were offered but all were voted down and the committee substitute for two windows in towns of 2,000 inhabitants was passed by a vote of 40 to 8.

This was ordered engrossed and sent to the House.
