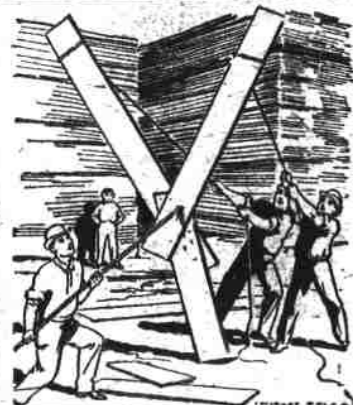

DEMOCRATS TO PROBE DEEP

Ballinger, Steel Trust, Friar Land Sale, Panama Canal Promotion, and Army Maneuvers.

Washington, March 17.—Plans for a long series of investigations as a part of a Democratic campaign for economy and retrenchment were tentatively determined upon by party leaders at the program for the extra session, in addition to Canadian reciprocity and a schedule by schedule revision of the tariff.

The probes will be incident, Democrats say, to a drastic pruning of the government pay roll. They hope incidentally to make campaign material for the Democratic party for 1912.

As a starter, it is stated, that the following investigations have already been decided upon:

To determine the real reason for the Texas army "maneuvers"

To discover why the steel trust has escaped prosecution under the Sherman anti-trust law.

To fix responsibility for the sale of the Philippine friar lands to the sugar trust.

To find out how much the promoters of the deal whereby the government purchased the Panama Canal from the old French company made.

To determine whether the activities of the various congressional commissions—which have furnished soft berths for a number of "lame ducks"—warrant their continuance.

To determine the truth of the charge of mismanagement and inefficiency in post-office department.

To reveal the actual conduct of the interior department under former Secretary Ballinger.

To inquire into the methods of the department of justice in its alleged pro-Diaz activity in connection with the Mexican revolution.

LOUIS WEST FOUND GUILTY

Of Murder in the First Degree. His Accomplice, Stetson, Found Guilty of Murder in the Second Degree.

On March 17, "Guilty of murder in the first degree as to West and guilty of murder in the second degree as to his accomplice, Stetson" was the verdict returned by the jury this afternoon in the trial of the murderers of Deputy Sheriff George Mumford in this city several weeks ago.

There was no demonstration in the crowded court room when the verdict was announced, as Judge Adams had warned the spectators against anything of this kind. The verdict is generally satisfactory though some expected first degree verdicts against both of the negroes. The Judge announced that he would not sentence the prisoners until tomorrow.

The other members of the West gang who were with their leader on the night of the murder, were then placed on trial. Will Lane, Will Smith, Matthew Mahane and Dave Young were found guilty of conspiracy and Wade Williams and Tom Smith were found guilty of carrying concealed weapons. Mary Young, at whose house the tragedy occurred, was found guilty of conducting a disorderly house. All of these will be sentenced tomorrow.

GOOD WILL NO LAW SUIT

Chamber of Commerce Rejects Railroad Offer, But Wishes to Compromise.

A meeting of the Chamber of Commerce was held at the office of the Secretary in the Elks Building last night to consider the proposition of the Norfolk Southern Railroad in regard to paying Hancock street. The proposition of the railroad was read by President Eby and in order to bring up the matter for discussion, R. A. Nunn moved that it be recommended to the board of aldermen that the proposition be refused, this being seconded by T. A. Green.

The proposition of the railroad to pay the city \$2500 in all, and be released from any further obligation for Hancock and South Front streets, the city to do the paving, if being estimated cost to the city would be \$4,400. On this question a considerable number of those present spoke, among them being L. H. Cutler, S. M. Brinson, B. B. Croson, Wm. Ellis, T. A. Green, T. G. Hymon, J. A. Bryan, and J. R. Blundie.

Mayor McCarthy was called upon and made a statement in regard to the proposition that had gone on with the railroad in which the railroad company increased their offer, beginning at \$4,000. The original contract is referred to the two streets were read and their meaning explained.

There was a disposition by some to make the railroad line "up to the letter" of the law, this being tempered a good deal by the question of whether the law's delay, expense of a suit and final decision would be favorable as a long and protracted one. The majority of the board resolved itself into the disposition to reach some final settlement on the road question, and while the railroad offer was recommended in rejection, a compromise was made to make with the committee of the board of aldermen and to go before the board, in order to negotiate some plan upon which an agreement with the railroad could be reached.

The committee named was: Chairman, C. E. Eby, R. A. Nunn, T. A. Green, J. A. Bryan, J. A. Bryan, L. H. Cutler, W. E. Lee, G. E. McClellan, T. G. Hymon, and J. R. Blundie.

MONUMENT TO UNIVERSITY BOYS

Will be Erected at Chapel Hill in Memory of Those Who Dropped Their Books to Take up Arms

The following communication has been received for publication which explains itself:

As you know, the Chapel Hill monument is to be erected under the auspices of the North Carolina Division of the Daughters of the Confederacy, who hope to have it unveiled during the next commencement, it being the fiftieth anniversary of the beginning of the war. And, moreover there will be a reunion of Confederate Veterans at the university at that time. But in order to unveil it at that time it will be necessary to complete the fund of \$7,500 which represents its cost. Each chapter is urged to send at once its contribution to the State Treasurer, Mrs. Robert Konegny, of Goldsboro, N. C. And each Chapter president is asked to appoint an active Chapter Committee to solicit contributions, not only from University Alumni, but from all persons who are willing to honor in this manner the memory of the University's Confederate soldiers with substantial contributions. It is desired that the names of contributors be given in every instance, so that they may be recorded at the University and also in our U. D. C. books. The monument to be erected on the campus at Chapel Hill is not only in memory of the "boys" who left the University in 1861 for the war, but also those who attended the University and afterwards became Confederate soldiers. There were more than one thousand University men in the struggle between the States. The monument has been designed by the Canadian sculptor, John Wilson, and will be very beautiful. The front die will bear a bronze tablet depicting a woman representing the State, appealing to a young student to take up arms for his commonwealth. Books are falling from the youth's arms as he listens to her appeal. The heroic figure surrounding the shaft represents a young soldier boy. Standing on the campus for all time it will be an object lesson to future generations of students and will impress upon them their obligations to respond to the call of duty. Unless a goodly sum is raised at once the monument cannot be unveiled during commencement, for at present we are almost at a standstill.
