OBEEDIENCE THE SUPREME DEMAND

From the beginning of the world, obedience has been demanded of men. As a divine injunction, peoples and nations have gone upward as world builders, or disappeared, their names a reproach and warning to succeeding generations.

In the ways of men, obedience has ever meant a cardinal virtue. A supreme test from early childhood to extreme old age, those obeying the demands set before them, have always commanded the world's approval and gained its greatest respect.

And yet with all the honor and respect that comes to the child and man who can obey, it has ever been the severest test put to parents, that of securing an obedience, not through the fear of punishment, but an obedience based upon the heart, to obey because such an act was one of love.

"Children who can wheedle their parents into letting them act foolishly are being educated to bribe legislatures into letting them act lawlessly," is the severe arraignment of parents by Dean Matthews. Note the word of action in this sentence, "wheedle." Is there another word to compare with it in description of the child's method to secure what it wants? It means the getting by unfair methods, prevailing against the parent's judgment, a cunning deception to disobey without paying the penalty, through a just punishment for the act committed. And while this arraignment may seem far reaching, how many parents in later years have been worse than humiliated by their children, who were permitted to wheedle their way from early childhood, until parental control was lost? Cannot there be seen on all sides, the results from obedience and disobedience, which trivial and not held important in the child, in the man and woman mean disgrace, dishonor and death?

Cicero was pretty correct in the statement that "dutifulness of children was the foundation of all virtues." As the supreme demand both divine and human calls for obedience, so is its reward the greatest, to those who learn the lesson and faithfully follow it.
