INSURRECTOS SURE OF SUCCESS

Honor Demand Resignation of Diaz. Will Fight Until Secure This.

Madero's Camp, Near Chihuahua, April 5.—A declaration that all talk of peace is futile as long as President Diaz refuses to resign and that the Cabinet changes at Mexico City have served only to convince the insurgents of their ultimate success was made by Francisco I. Madero, Jr., the provisional President, in an interview.

The interview was an amplification of one which he gave a few days ago. Madero declared he was confident of the final triumph of arms in the overthrow of Diaz.

In all Northern Mexico, he said, the insurrecto movement was spreading until now the Federal troops were confined to the garrison towns, "at which the insurrectos were preparing to strike a decisive blow."

Referring to his father and Gustavo A. Madero, his brother who were reported to have initiated peace plans with Finance Minister Limantour with a view of ending the war, the insurrectionary President intimated strongly that they had no authority to act for him and he would not accept any proposals which were not addressed directly either to himself or to Dr. Vazquez Gomez, his confidential agent in the United States.

Fire at Bridgeton.

Shortly after 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon the home of Mr. J. W. Brooks, located near the Blides Lumber Company's mill at Bridgeton, was destroyed by fire. The building was valued at \$2500 but only \$1000 insurance was carried on it. There was no insurance on the furniture.

MORE PATRONAGE CUT OFF

War Veterans Share Greatly Reduced The Congressional Patronage Spoils.

Washington, April 5.—The patronage of the House, cut down by the action of Saturday's caucus from \$764,000 a year to \$500,000, must suffer further depletion before the special committee can begin proceedings to cut off the constituents of the winners at the November election.

After the committee clerkships and additional help have been deducted from the total the old soldiers' roll must be included, for the veterans of the civil war still serving in Congress have to be retained, politics or no politics.

This brings the total patronage available for distribution by the members of the House outside the chairman of the fifty-six committees to just \$266,689.25, not a huge sum when it is considered that there are 171 such Congressmen—about \$1,500 per man. The Republicans used to distribute more than \$2,500 each.

THE RECORDERS COURT.

Isn't it rather strange that the proposition for the establishment of a Recorder's Court here should meet with such enthusiastic opposition from certain quarters, when it is a known fact to all who have investigated this matter, that these courts are now in operation, or will be in operation in the next few months, in Elizabeth City, Washington, Aurora, Hol Haven, Wilmington, Fayetteville, Goldsboro, Plymouth, Tarboro, Rocky Mount, Henderson, Nashville, Durham, Burlington, Monroe, Salisbury, Mount Airy, Charlotte, Asheville, and other places, and are saving to the taxpayers of North Carolina thousands of dollars. The most enthusiastic opponent of the Recorder's Court in the County of Craven, seen at an argument the fact that Craven county did without this court for two hundred years, and thus could do without it many years more. However, when he so enthusiastically supported the proposition to increase the taxation of the citizenship of New Bern by issuing bonds to the amount of \$150,000, and paving the streets, he did not refer to the fact that New Bern had done without paved streets for two hundred years, and thus could do without them for many years more.

This is an age of progress. The criminal courts of Craven county are blockaded for the trial of misdemeanors that would be disposed of by the establishment of this court. Witnesses who heretofore have to sit around the court house one solid week to give testimony in some misdemeanor and have their witness ticket paid by the county, under the new system, would only be taken from their work an hour or two at the most. Instead of having taxpayers on the grand jury one week, the grand jury would be done with its work in a day. There has been some objection to the establishment of the court that the jury would be often called on to serve on juries in this ward. The bill provides that the sheriff or the defendant shall have the right to trial by jury for the same as he has the right to a jury trial, and any one who is familiar with the administration of the law at present in Craven county, knows that there is not a magistrate in the county who can do better jury trials than the jury. There is nothing to be apprehended in the establishment of a court of this kind.

GREAT BRITAIN APPROVES TAFT'S

Proposition For Anglo American Arbitration Treaty. Germany's Sea Outlet.

London, April 5.—American Ambassador Reid is receiving for presentation to the State Department at Washington numerous resolutions adopted by city and borough councils of the United Kingdom approving President Taft's suggestion for an Anglo-American arbitration treaty to cover every dispute.

Sir Oliver Lodge, writer and principal of the University of Birmingham, in a long review of the possibilities for universal arbitration, holds that while everything arbitral should be arbitrated there are certain things which no nation would consent to submit to arbitration.

For instance, he does not believe the United States would agree to arbitrate the matter should a European power be unwise enough to interfere in the event that difficulty arose between the American government and Mexico. Similarly England would never except arbitration should a foreign power insist upon home rule for Ireland, or if France desired to arbitrate an issue in Egypt.

Touching upon the position of Germany, Lodge foresees in the near future the question of a German outlet to the Mediterranean occupying the centre of the stage in world politics. This he also considers outside the possibility of arbitration, as he believes that to secure such an outlet has been a long-standing secret policy of the German government, in navy and military circles the suggestion has been advanced more than once privately that the real objective of the German navy is the Mediterranean, not the North Sea; Oliver now openly voices the same idea, suggesting that upon the death of the Austrian Emperor Germany will make a great effort to secure a seaport on the Adriatic with a territorial connection with Germany.

The new German Navy, the writer contends, is intended to overawe Italy and France in order that the operation may be done peacefully in spite of their protests. In such an event he maintains that Great Britain should keep her hands off and not attempt to curb Germany's just colonial ambitions.
