**COTTON CASES NOW ON TRIAL**

Monday's Session of the Federal Court Consumed in Taking Evidence in One Case.

The second week of the Spring term of Federal Court now sitting in this city began work Monday on the famous cotton cases.

The first case called was that of Euse Harris & Co., of Norfolk; E. W. Sabiston, of Onslow. The plaintiff alleged that Mr. Sabiston agreed and contracted to deliver to them on a specified date certain number bales of cotton at a stated price, and that defendant had failed to perform his part of the contract.

Evidence for both sides was concluded and court took a recess until this morning 9:30 o'clock, when argument by the attorneys will be given. The plaintiffs are represented by Moore & Dunn, of this city. The defendant's counsel are Col. P. M. Pearsall and T. D. Warren, New Bern; C. B. Aycock, Raleigh; E. M. Koons, Jacksonville, and Rudolph Duffy, of Catherine Lake.

These cases are attracting considerable attention as those involved, either as principals or witnesses, are some of the most prominent people of this section.

**The Danger of Going Barefooted.**

As the season is now approaching when all the children desire to go barefooted, it is well that they should be warned that this pleasure does not come without danger. Until recent years we attached little importance to ground itch, or toe-itch, so commonly seen among barefooted children who go about in the dew or other damp places. We now know ground itch is the initial symptom of hookworm disease and that it would not develop unless the soil had been polluted by sufferers from the disease. The myriads of eggs passing daily along with the excreta from their bodies develop into tiny microscopic worms too small to be seen. These, when allowed to come in contact with the skin, burrow through producing an attack of ground-itch. The truth of this assertion can be easily proved by making a poultice of polluted soil and applying it for a few hours to some part of the body. Always at the site of such a poultice there develops the ground-itch rash if there be a sufficient number of worms entering the skin.

Moreover, it is known that about fifty days after the attack of ground-itch the little worms that entered the skin will have found their way to the small intestine and there developed to a size sufficient for them to be easily seen with the naked eye. They are nearly one-half inch in length. The medicine given to get rid of them, by acting as a poison, causes them to be expelled from the body. By washing the stools through coarse cloth they may be collected.

The harm they produce is now well recognized and requires discussion at this time. Suffice it to say that the blood is sapped, the liver enlarged, the vitality lowered. Thus the life and happiness of those doomed to it may be blasted. It is now time every one should know what is meant by ground-itch, how worms develop, and how they may be expelled from the body.

**MILLIONS IN NICKELS**

1910 Coins Good As Any In Existence Not Counterfeit.

Washington, May 1—Some lively jokers in the Middle West caused the banks, the Treasury, the Secret Service and a lot of other folk a heap of trouble by spreading a story that the Government coined no nickels in 1910, and that every five-cent piece in circulation bearing that date must therefore be a counterfeit.

The facts are that the mints clicked off 30,169,353 nickels, real and genuine, during 1910, and about \$1,004,000 worth of those coins are in circulation. For the last two days the Mint Bureau and the Secret Service have been besieged with calls for help from banks of the Middle West. Many of the genuine coins have been turned into Washington as counterfeits.

**THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS**

Held Regular Monthly Meeting Yesterday But Little Business Transacted.

The Board of Commissioners of Craven county met at the court house yesterday morning and remained in session all during the day. Despite the fact, however there was but little business transacted.

One of the most important subjects brought before the board was that in regard to the Central Highway. At the last meeting of the board the chairman was ordered to purchase six mules which were to be used in the road work. Yesterday he informed the board that he had received several bids from local dealers in mules and horses since that time and that Mr. J. A. Jones had made the cheapest bid: offering to buy the mules and sell them to the county at cost plus his expenses to the northern markets and that he would sell them on time. The board adjourned to Mr. Jones' stables where after they had looked the animals over they decided to purchase them for \$350 each. The board also decided to purchase two wagons to be used in this work.

Convicts will be used in building this highway and as they will move from place to place it is impossible for them to have a stationary camp. In view of this fact the board decided to purchase several tents to be used by them while this work is in progress.

Among the bills presented to the board was one for \$3 for cleaning up the office of the sheriff, clerk of the court and the register or deeds. This bill caused considerable discussion as there is a janitor employed at the building for the purpose of keeping it clean, it was turned down.

The following assist assessors were named by the board: C. K. Hancock, Walter Duffy, E. E. Harper, Geo. D. Dail, Edward Clark, L. S. Wood.
