STANDARD OIL DECISION

ALL AROUND VICTORY

The Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, the father of the gigantic trust comprising thirty-three allied corpora tionf, and representing an aggregate capital of \$600,00,000, must effect a dissolution. Its business must be restored to the subsidiary concerns. That was the decision of the United States Supreme Court.

It was a verdict that the ordin ary business man would consider as adverse to this gigantic corporation and to all others that oper ate in "restraint" of trade. To the average speculator it might łook like a verdict hostile to Wall Street. But the Standard Oil Co. shows no sign of being at all disturbed, nor does any other trust combination give signs of being fearful for the future. The Stock market that for weeks had been lifeless in its tradings, the day following the verdict at once develop ed unusual activity, with prices going rapidly upward. Here are legitimate and speculative trade interests both rather helped, when the government orders the disso lution of a company whose allied capital is \$600,000,000. The Stand ard Oil Company as a corporation has been a menace to commercial life, in its unrestrained monopoly. Its dissolution must likely result, the the form taken is not likely to be a literal dismemberment, for the same keen business acumen that conceived, developed and brought to full maturity Standard Oil, has looked forward to such a verdict as the Supreme Court rendered, and is prepered to meet the situation,

But something more than legis lative constructson and a verdict upon that basis is demanded, if the Sherman anti-trust act is have its full force, for violations of this act call for criminal trial and presecution, with verdicts that shail be personal, not corporate, and the punishment be visited upon the living individuals of the monopoly that violates law, and not a punishment to be meted out upon an inanimate corporation without body to suffer or a soul to be tormented.

It is this very public sentiment that prevails, that seems to ask for a legislative rather than a judicial verdict, that makes the verdict one that strikes monopoly, forcing a bad trust to be a good acting directly on the mucous surtrust, or give up, and yet causes no disturbance to trade and property the two ingredients is what produces values, this causes the general satislaction. It may be that the verdict is all sufficient for the present time, and will have the desired effect of breaking up in future all combinations that are in "res traint" of trade.

On Friday, June 9th, the Trustees of the Craven County Farm-Life School will meet at the court house in the city of New Bern to consider among other Schedule Effective January 29, 1911 things the matter of the location of the proposed Farm-Life School.

The meeting will be held at 11 a. m. Sealed bids should be sent to S. M. Brinson, Secretary of the Board of Trustees, at New Bern, N. C., so as to each him by 11 a. m. on said day of meeting.

Sections 5 and 6 of said act are as fol-

The county of Newedd (showing house)-This is the township or school district, or all combined, shall also provide by bond issue, or otherwise, the following equipment for said school; a school building with recitation rooms and laboratories and apparatus necessary for efficient instruction in the prescribed subjects of study; dormitory buildings with suits ble accommodations for not less than 2 ding with necessary equipment; a farm of not less than 25 acres of good arable land. All of said buildings shall be located on said farm and shall be con structed in accordance with plans approved by the State Superintendent of Hay, Corn, Brand, Ship Stuff Public Instruction, and the entire equip ment shall be subject to his approval and acceptance after inspection: Provided, however, that, upon recommendation of the board of trustees and the presentation of satisfactory reasons therefor, the State Superincendent of Public Instruction may grant permis sion to said board of trustees to accept any suitable and properly equipped school building already constructed, though it may not be located on said farm, provided it be located within rea sonable and convenient distance thereof, and may also grant permission to reduce the required acresge for the farm to not less than ten agres.
