## HOT WAVE TAKES TOLL

Eight Deaths Reported In Washington City. Hottest May Since 1880.

Washington, May 19.—This is the hottest May here since 1880 and coupled with the excessive humidity, it is sweltering mid-summer weather. Eighty-seven degrees is the announcement of the Weather Bureau, but on the street unofficial thermometers registered 92 and in some places 95 was registered.

Seven deaths, one a suicide, were directly attributed to heat prostrations. All the way from the Rocky Mountains to the Atlantic coast stretches a hot wave, with temperatures almost breaking records in various cities and causing prostrations galore. From out of the North Pacific, however, relief is coming in a storm with considerably cooler weather in its wake. This storm moved east Thursday over the northern plains States bringing high winds and showers. It was scheduled by Weather Forecaster Bowie today to reach the Mississippi Valley today. It will be followed says Professor Bowie, "by a general break in the hot wave over the Mississippi and Plains States within the next 36 or 48 hours." The hot wave is due to moderate in the eastern States Saturday and Sunday.

Washington and Richmond were yesterday the hottest places on the weather map, their official record running up to 95 against Washington's seasonal record breaking 84 a week ago. Baltimore, Louisville, and other cities, however, were close competitors. The street thermometers in the shade here recorded 103 while one in the sun ran up to 106. There was one heat prostration.

Washington, May 19.—The fight to change the date for inaugurating the President and Vice-President has begun in the Senate. A joint resolution was introduced by Mr. Gallinger fixing the date on the last Thursday of April instead of March 4th, as heretofore. It is proposed to submit an amendment to the Constitution for ratification by the States making the suggested change effective. A similar resolution has been offered in the House.

## OPPOSE CANADIAN RECIPROCIITY

The Lumber Interests of Three Southern States Bitterly Oppose the Bill.

Washington, May 19.—Representatives of the lumber industry in Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina appeared before the Senate Finance Committee in opposition to the Canadian reciprocity bill.

Geo. W. Jones, of Norfolk, declared that reciprocity "should not be built up at the expense of the one-gallon saw mill workers of the South." Others who opposed the bill were W. B. Roper, secretary of the North Carolina Pine Association; A. R. Turnbull, and H. Clay Tunis, the North Carolina lumber manufacturers.

Mr. Jones characterized as absurd the allegation that a lumber trust existed and declared that in the last 30 years fully 80 per cent of short leaf manufacturers of Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina had failed because of inability to get together on prices and because of keen competition.

### Officer Parker Exonerated.

After holding an autopsy over the body of George Green, the colored man who was shot by policeman Parker a few weeks ago while he was attempting to burglarize Boom's meat market at Five Points and who died at Stewart's sanitarium Thursday morning, the coroner's jury rendered a verdict that the deceased came to his death from the effects of a shot wound inflicted by an officer in discharge of his duty and that no blame was attached to the officer for firing upon the deceased.

When the officer fired upon the negro he was advancing toward him and made no attempt to halt when ordered to do so. It was discovered after he had been shot that he had on his person a deadly weapon, to-wit; a large knife and it is more than probable that he would have used this if the opportunity had been afforded him.

## "BUTTON" LOWER WORLD'S RECORD

Won First Prize In the Interstate Race at Charlotte Yesterday. Time 26 2/5 Seconds.

In the Interstate horse race wagon races held at Charlotte yesterday morning the New Bern No. 1 Company won the first prize and also lowered the world's record by making the run in 26 2/5 seconds.

The Kinston Company won the second prize, making the run in 27 2/5 seconds while the Raleigh Company won the third prize by making the run in 28 2/5 seconds. The Atlantic race wagon made the run in 30 3/5 seconds.

When the New Bern boys left this city to attend the Firemen's tournament they expressed their intention of returning with all of the first prize money in the contests which they entered and they have kept their promise with one exception, that being the long distance engine contest. In two of the horse wagon races the local boys won the first prize and also in the quick steaming contest.
