## GENERAL LEE'S CLAIM APPROVED

### Court Awards Widow Judgment Against Exposition Company For Salary Due Him.

Norfolk, Va., May 25.—The claim of Mrs. Ellen B. Lee, widow of General Fitzhugh Lee, for salary due General Lee as president of the Jamestown Exposition Company prior to his death in 1907 has been approved in a report filed in the United States Circuit Court here by J. W. Wilcox, special master in the action under which the affairs of the Jamestown Exposition Company are now being wound up. Mrs. Lee claimed at first \$22,000 in salary due, but the exposition governors, before the failure of the company, compromised the account by a cancellation of stock subscription, and the special master now finds that there is remaining due to the estate of General Lee \$5,400.

### Correct Dress at Weddings.

In an article on "The Etiquette of Weddings," in the June Woman's Home Companion, Christine Terhune Herrick has the following to say about correct dress:

"After the ceremony, if there is to be a reception, the guests follow the bride and groom to her home. The bride's mother leaves at the same time as the bride, if not before, so that she may be there to greet the guests when they arrive. The bride and her attendants at once take place with her father and mother, to meet congratulating relatives and friends. Unless there is a formal collation served, the bride does not usually go into the dining-room, but partakes of some refreshment brought to her in the reception room.

"The dress for the mother is, of course, always the same for a wedding in the day (low, a fresh, cool, light dress, gray or lavender, gloves and a button-hole bouquet. High heels are on right. The bride, if this is her first marriage, wears white, usually with a veil. Her gown should be made with a high neck, or at least with a graceful, and she should wear little or no jewelry. The bridesmaids will have undergarments if all are married girls.

"The bridesmaids wear light-colored dresses, usually a shade of lavender, and are usually wearing high heels and carrying bouquets of flowers.

## WILL ADOPT PRESENT ROAD

### Good Roads Meeting and Picnic Held at Riverview Yesterday. Number of Visitors Present.

Yesterday was gala day at Riverview and it was a day that will live long in the minds of citizens of that place and the surrounding locality. The Methodist Sunday School of that place held their annual picnic yesterday, and in addition to this a "Good Roads" meeting was also held. A number of New Bern citizens went down on the early train and a few hours later another party left for the scene of the festivities in automobiles, arriving there shortly before noon.

At the conclusion of the meeting resolutions were passed adopting the present road between New Bern and Beaufort as good for the Central Highway. After this had been done the meeting adjourned and the visitors returned to their homes.

The people of that locality are especially interested in this Central Highway and have promised the commission to give them all of the assistance possible in building the road.

### Notice to Mariners.

Albemarle Sound—Coastal light station—characteristic of light, column 5, to be amended as follows:  
Fixed white with a fixed red sector between 270° and 315°.

Beaufort Harbor—range lights established, May 5, to mark dredged channel across bar.

Beaufort Point Range.  
Front light, a fixed red lens lantern light screened so that it will not be visible in line with Bird Island range rear light, shown 15 feet above water, from a red 3 pile horizontally slatted structure.

Rear light, a fixed white lens lantern light, illuminating the entire horizon, shown 21 feet above water, from a 3 pile horizontally slatted structure, surmounted by post, about 3,000 feet (3 miles) 370 feet (N. E. N. mag.) in rear of front light.

Bird Island Range.  
Front Light, a fixed red lens lantern light, screened so that it will not be visible in line with Beaufort Point range rear light, shown 15 feet above water, from a red 3 pile horizontally slatted structure.

Rear Light, a fixed white lens lantern light, illuminating the entire horizon, shown 21 feet above water, from a 3 pile horizontally slatted structure, surmounted by post, about 3,000 feet (3 miles) 370 feet (N. E. N. mag.) in rear of front light.

Albemarle Sound, Norfolk Southern railroad bridge across Albemarle Sound (North Carolina Railway bridge) Durham and New Bern established. The span is 164 feet high, erected on top of bridge at draw and having 2 spans each. The toll is payable by hand during thick or foggy weather.

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## TAFT REFUSES TO PARDON

### Says That Banking Laws Must Be Upheld. Declines To Interfere With Sentences.

Washington, May 25.—President Taft denied the applications for the pardon of Charles W. Morse, of New York, and John R. Walsh, of Chicago, the two most prominent bankers ever convicted and sent to Federal penitentiaries under the National banking laws. Not only did the President refuse to pardon either Morse or Walsh, but he declined at this time to exercise any other sort of executive clemency in these cases or to shorten the sentences imposed upon the two men by the courts in which they were convicted.

### Stimson May Run With Taft.

Washington, May 25.—One of the most interesting bits of political gossip Washington has heard in a long while current here to the effect that the entrance of Henry L. Stimson, of New York into President's Cabinet may mean that he will be Mr. Taft's running mate in the campaign of 1912. President Taft, it is said, fully expects to be renominated and little consideration is given here to reports to the contrary. The advisers of the President in casting about for a man to head the ticket with him are said to look with much favor upon Mr. Stimson, the new Secretary of War. They appear to be particularly anxious to get a strong man from the progressive element on the ticket, and prefer one from a pivotal State like New York.
