CUTTER CREW FINDS BODY

Of Mr. J. J. Willey, Who Was Drowned At Wilkinson's Point Sunday.

Yesterday morning a crew from the revenue cutter, Pamlico, and also one or two other boats from this port went down to Wilkinson's point, the scene of Sunday's tragedy in which Messrs. J. J. Willey of this city and J. H. Morris of Greensboro lost their lives while attempting to swim across the channel and at once began a search for Mr. Willey's body.

Shortly before 11 o'clock the grappling hook struck some object lying on the bottom of the river about 50 feet from the place that Mr. Willey was last seen and his body ascended to the surface. The body was badly decomposed having been in the water for such a long time and those on board of the boat, unaccustomed as they were to ghastly sights turned away their faces.

The body was brought to this city and carried at once to H. W. Simpson's undertaking parlors where it was embalmed and prepared for shipment to his home in Norfolk this morning.

The crew of the revenue cutter, Pamlico, deserve much praise for their work in finding the bodies of these unfortunate men. Unceasingly they toiled from early Monday morning until the last body was found yesterday and but for their efforts it is not probable the either of them have been located for several days.

Washington, June 13—The Senate by 64 to 24 passed the resolution amending the constitution to provide for election of senators by direct popular vote.

The Bristow amendment giving to the Federal government supervision of such elections, was adopted, 44 to 44, the Vice President casting the deciding vote. The House already has passed the resolution.

BUSY DAY IN SUPERIOR COURT

Abduction Case Took Up Entire Session Yesterday. Court Room Crowded.

The entire session of Craven County Superior Court which is in session here this week for the trial of criminal cases with Judge Garland S. Ferguson presiding, was taken up with the case of the State vs Addison Toler of No. 2 Township who was charged with abduction.

The facts in the case are familiar to the majority of our readers but for the benefit of others we will give a brief summary of the charges leading up to the prosecution. Sometime ago it is claimed, Toler became enamored with Mrs. Martha Rowe, wife of Mr. Marjoh Rowe, who resided in the same Township. It is claimed that he induced the woman to leave her husband and that soon after her departure her husband went west and died. Later on Toler married her.

A large number of witnesses were examined during the day and considerable time was taken up in this manner. Late in the afternoon the testimony was all in and the attorneys in the case began their argument. It was after 6 o'clock when this was concluded and after the Judge had charged the jury they retired. Up to a late hour last night they had brought in no decision.

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NEGRO BOY MURDERS ANOTHER

Two Negro Youths Fall Out Over a Handful Of Peanuts And Fight to Kill.

Tuesday night about 10:30 o'clock two negro boys, each about 14 years old, living in Duffytown, got into a row over the division of a few peanuts and the result is that one lies dead and the other is in jail. The dead boy was named David Fonville and the murderer is Charley Latham.

From what could be learned, Latham had the peanuts and when Fonville demanded a division he refused to make it whereupon Fonville drew a knife and made an assault on the other who repulsed it with a pistol, firing. The ball struck his assistant in the right eye, tearing a hole through the head almost large enough to toss a baseball.

Chief of Police Lupton was notified of the occurrence, immediately repaired to the scene, placed Latham under arrest and conducted him to jail where he is now incarcerated, awaiting an investigation by the Coroner.

PIECES OF MAIL IN MONTH OF MAY

Every Piece Counted By Employees In The New Bern Post Office.

Postmaster J. S. Basnight has completed his report of the No. of pieces of mail handled in the local office during the month of May and as soon as the abstracts are filled out with all the information desired by the department the report will be forwarded to Washington. The object of the postal department is instituting the count and securing the report from every postoffice in the United States is a complete data whereby postal classifications and rates may be revised when necessary without discrimination.

When the question of increasing postage required for carrying magazines was raised recently the lack of any real information regarding the amount of time required to handle that any other class of mail matters, and therefore the cost of such handling to the department, was greatly felt in the investigation and this fact rendered any action in raising the rates open in question. The information which the count instituted for last month's supplies includes the number of pieces of mail of each class handled and the amount of time required to handle each class.

New Bern's report shows that during the month 201,141 pieces of mail matter passed through the hands of the employees of the office, not including the number of newspapers from each postoffice which made up their monthly bill and which in each year is being brought into the post office. A count of this class of mail matters will be made during the coming month.

The report shows that 10,120 letters were sent in the month, 10,000 were received, 15,000 were sent in the month and 14,000 were received.

MRS. CASEY IS PLACED IN JAIL

She and Her Husband Awaiting The Action of the Grand Jury. More Particulars.

Last Monday afternoon Mrs. Leona Casey, of Lare's Chapel whose husband, Burrill Casey was arrested in this city several hours previous on a warrant charging him with poisoning Mr. Joseph Whitty of that place, was placed under arrest by Chief of Police Rouse, of Dover, and on Monday night was brought to this city and placed in Craven county jail. Both she and her husband are now confined in this institution but on different floors, awaiting the action of the grand jury who are investigating their case.

This case promises to be one of the most sensational that has been brought before the public in some time. Yesterday the reporter made several inquiries in regard to the matter, and he was informed that the arrest of these two people was the culmination of a series of investigation that had been going on for the past year.

After Mr. Joseph Whitty's death, which occurred so suddenly a little more than a year ago, several of his relatives began a quiet investigation. A physician from the city went to the place where the body was buried and after exhuming it he had the stomach taken out, and this was thoroughly examined by him. He was convinced that there were indications of poisoning there but in order to be certain he sent the stomach to the State Chemist. He gave it a careful examination and also found indications of poison. When this state of affairs was recorded to the relatives of the deceased they were more fully convinced that there had been foul play.

As was stated in yesterday morning's Journal, it was a known fact that Casey had been very intimate with Mr. Whitty's wife while her husband was living, and after the two were joined in the bonds of wedlock within three short weeks after the death of her husband, this of course caused suspicion to fall on them.

Some of the leading legal talent of the city has been secured by the relatives of the dead man to aid in the prosecution, and if the grand jury returns a true bill every effort will be made to convict him.
