## SUPERIOR COURT NEARING CLOSE

Today The Last of a One Week Term. Number Cases Disposed of Yesterday.

Today is the last day of a one week term of Craven County Superior Court for the trial of criminal cases which has been in session here all this week and when the last case has been concluded both judge and the counsel will doubtless breathe a sign of relief for the past few days have been very strenuous ones for them. At yesterday's session the following cases were disposed of:

State vs J. E. Gosley, of Bridgeton, charged with false pretense the jury rendered a verdict of not guilty.

State vs Matthew Williams, charged with retailing, found guilty and sentenced to serve a term of 3 months on the county roads.

State vs Bud Green, charged with resisting arrest, found guilty and sentenced to serve 30 days on the county roads.

One or two other small cases were also disposed of during the day by the defendants paying all of the costs.

High Price Cotton Closes Them.

Mobile, Ala., June 16.—The Mobile Cotton Mill Company, employing 150 hands, has shut down its plant. The Kasker Cotton Mill, employing 50 hands, will work on a four days a week basis.

On account of the high price of cotton, which it is stated, makes it impossible to operate at a profit, the Montana cotton mills, with ten thousand spindles, and the Montgomery Cordage Co., using 125 bales of cotton a month, have closed their plants for the summer. They will not resume until the new crop is harvested in the fall.

It is stated that two mills at Selma, Ala., and one at Florence, Ala. have suspended operations for similar reasons, and that the mills at Avondale, Ala., and Columbus, Ga., are running on short time.

Senate Confirms Appointment of Lewis.

Washington, June 16.—After a fight lasting more than two months the Senate today confirmed William H. Lewis, the Boston negro attorney to be Assistant Attorney General of the United States. The fight on Lewis' confirmation was waged by Southern Senators who prevented action.

## WANTS ROCKEFELLER PROSECUTED

Pathway Marked By Many Victims Says Ohio Senator.

Washington, June 16.—Making a direct demand for the criminal prosecution of John D. Rockefeller, Senator Pomerene (Dem., Ohio) delivered a powerful arraignment of Standard Oil and Tobacco Trust magnates in the Senate, saying of Rockefeller:

"His pathway is marked by a great number of victims whose business careers he has ruined by his unlawful methods than that of any other man in the industrial history of this country, and yet he has gone unwhipped of justice."

In his peroration Pomerene exclaimed: "Speaking for myself, I think it high time the American people should understand whether the Stars and Stripes are to be the emblems of their power and authority or the emblems of the oil barrel and the tobacco tag!"

Pomerene spoke on his resolution instructing Attorney General Wickersham to institute criminal proceedings immediately against the men behind the big trusts recently found guilty by the highest court. In part he said:

"The law is no respecter of persons, and the Government ought not to be. Statutes should be enforced, or they should be repealed. The poor and lowly are not above the law, and the rich and the strong in combination ought not to be permitted to violate it with impunity."

Washington's Oldest Doctor Dead.

Washington, N. C., June 16.—Dr. William A. Blount, Washington's oldest practicing physician and one of our most influential and well beloved citizens is dead at his home on Second street. Dr. Blount was taken suddenly ill Tuesday, and although everything possible that medical skill could accomplish was tried in vain.

The deceased was about 73 years of age. He is survived by a heartbroken widow, two children, Dr. John B. Blount, Jr., and Mrs. W. E. Ellison; two sisters, Mrs. Willard and Mrs. J. K. Hatton, and one brother, Maj. Joe G. Blount.

The funeral will be conducted from St. Peter's Episcopal church at 11 o'clock Saturday morning, and interment will be in Oakdale cemetery.

Washington, D. C. June 5.—The end of this month promises to find the Federal Treasury in a better condition than it has enjoyed for two years. While the past year already shows an ordinary surplus of more than \$5,000,000 against a deficit of \$13,000,000 a year ago at this time, there is promise that the total deficit now standing at \$21,000,000 may be much reduced before the new fiscal year begins.

## ANOTHER ALLEGED RETAILER CAUGHT

John Furlow, Colored, Arraigned Before Commissioner C. B. Hill Yesterday Afternoon.

Yesterday morning John Furlow, colored was tried in the Superior Court for retailing. J. E. Eason and J. D. Erwin, two young white men from Kinston, were the principal witnesses in the case. After the jury had weighed the evidence they rendered a verdict that the defendant was not guilty and he was released from custody. He was at once placed under arrest by a government officer on a warrant charging him with retailing without government license.

He was carried before Commissioner Chas. B. Hill yesterday afternoon and given a preliminary hearing. After the evidence in the case had been heard Commissioner Hill found probable cause and bound the defendant over to the next term of Federal court which convenes in this city in October, under a bond of \$100. In default of this he was committed to Craven county jail.

King Cotton Clothes World Potentates.

San Benito, Texas, June 16.—President Taft, the King of England and the Governor-General of Canada are to be presented with suits of clothes made from the first bale of cotton of this season's growth.

At a meeting of the Commercial Club of San Benito it was decided to trace the cotton which was raised in this country, to Manchester, England, where it is destined, and have it woven into cloth from which the clothes are to be made.

Will Confine Their Work on Tariff.

Washington, June 16.—An attempt to extend the legislative program of the Democratic majority in the house at this extra session of Congress failed completely at a caucus of the Democratic representatives. The result is a reinforced determination of the Democrats to confine their legislative efforts at this session to the tariff.

Among matters which the caucus turned down was the bill providing for a change from three to five years as the enlistment period in the army and other organization bills introduced by Chairman Hey, of the committee on military affairs, bills which the committee on naval affairs wished to have passed at this session and other minor bills and emergency measures were denied consideration.

"The action of the caucus simply means that we will go ahead with the tariff program as originally outlined at the opening of the session," said Democratic Leader Underwood. After the caucus several members declared there might be another caucus later to determine upon a short extra program, but the party leaders expressed the opinion that nothing further would be added to the legislative program.
