Mr. and Mrs. David Ray, of Wilmington, are here on a fishing trip, and are catching "sheep head" right off the wharf.

Messrs R. L., and Joseph Stallings and R. G. Newson, of New Bern, are here to complete the plumbing for the new Tarrymore Hotel.
