**FIXING NEWSPAPER RESPONSIBILITY.**

The introduction of Senator Grady's bill, to force newspapers to give the authorship of every article appearing in their columns, with of course punishment for failure to do, is one of the fool bills that seem always a part of State and National legislations.

Perhaps no responsibility is so assuredly established as that of the newspaper. That an article is not signed, whether of local or general import, under a date line of some place miles away, or without a date line, does not lessen the responsibility, if there be anything involving individual rights. The fact that such a responsibility exists saves the public from a certain class of publications that would levy tribute upon man and woman on every opportunity. And on the other side there are newspapers whose columns would be clean, no matter if no legal responsibility was laid upon them for articles appearing in their columns.

The clean and honest newspaper, like the moral individual, never thinks of the law, because their characters abhor uncleanness and dishonesty. The newspaper and the person that work and live by taking note of the statutes before acting, are necessarily evil in mind and purpose before they do anything, and the fear of the law is their governing power which affects their movements in advance. The publisher is responsible for every item that appears in the paper. The man who writes the article is not responsible for it; that is, he is no more responsible for it than is a workman in the shop responsible for the accident that happens on account of an imperfect piece of machinery that is turned out in the shop—which is another way of saying that he is responsible only to the head of the establishment, and not to party injured.

The law is already perfectly clear as to newspaper responsibility and liability. Such bills as Senator Grady's are entirely uncalled for, and provoke suspicion that their framers have personal malice in introducing and seeking their passage.

**MEASURING THE EARTH.**

**Eratosthenes Made the First Attempt and Did Fairly Well.**  
The earliest attempt to measure the circumference of the earth was made by a Greek, Eratosthenes who was born 276 B. C. He found that at Syene the gnomon, or upright pillar, used by the Greeks to measure the height of the sun in the sky, showed the sun to be exactly overhead at midday at the time of the summer solstice, while at Alexandria the gnomon cast a shadow upon the same date, showing that the latter point was one-fiftieth of the earth's circumference north of Syene.

Eratosthenes reasoned correctly that the length of the shadow at Alexandria bore the same relation to the circumference of the small circle described from the top of the gnomon as a center that the distance between the two cities bore to the circumference of the globe. This latter was 5,000 stadia, or about 625 miles, which when multiplied by fifty gives 31,250 miles as the circumference of the earth. This result is not quite correct, but as nearly so as could be expected from the first rough attempt to estimate it.—New York Mail.
